Why Mr. Norwood Won't Back=Stand the Suit

A YOUNG LAWYER AT PACES, VIRGINIA, HAS INSTITUTED A SUIT IN FEDERAL COURT ASKING THE APPOINTMENT OF A RECEIVER FOR THE TOBACCO GROWERS CO-OPERATIVE ASSOCIATION. HE WROTE A LETTER, WHICH WAS PUBLISHED, ASKING PRESIDENT GEORGE A. NORWOOD OF THE ASSOCIATION FOR RESOURCES WITH WHICH TO PROSECUTE THE SUIT.

HERE'S MR. NORWOOD'S REPLY

"I desire to say very frankly to you that I have had the opportunity to observe your activities against the association prior to the institution of this suit. I cannot convince myself that you are acting for the benefit of the association. I can only conclude that you are desirous of destroying it. You have stated to the Executive Committee of the association, in my presence, that you were not a member of the association, although you were eligible for membership. I cannot comprehend how a man who has refused to join this association and who has, since its organization, sold his tobacco at auction can be the 'disinterested friend' you claim to be.

I would remind you further that upon one occasion when you appeared before the Executive Committee . . . you had approached certain members of the association and sought employment with the promise to them that your services would cost them nothing.

"With these things in mind I cannot believe that the motives which actuate you now are different from the motives which actuated you then. I, therefore, cannot advise the board to lend you any assistance as a friend of this association."
