**Wants Highway To
Guilford Battleground**

Greensboro, Nov. 13.—"Uncle" Joe Cannon, who for many years sat in congress, as speaker of the house for a long, long time, will try to get congress to pass a bill authorizing construction of a national highway from Guilford College to Guilford Battleground, S. W. H. Smith, local man, who would like to see the road built, said today.

Mr. Smith is a warm friend of the Illinois statesman, who he convinced to support this bill, which will be introduced by Maj. Charles M. Stedman, representative in the house from the fifth North Carolina district. But "Uncle" Joe was not always in favor of doing something for Guilford.

Mr. Cannon actually voted against the bill to make Guilford Battleground a national park, but afterward expressed regret that he had done so, Mr. Smith said.

The local man told of the move of the Cannon family from Guilford College community, while Joe Cannon was but a child.

"Good-bye civilization," were the words spoken by his mother, Mrs. Guilhelma Hollingsworth Cannon, when the covered wagon drew away from the old Cannon homestead, starting on the long trip to Illinois. "Uncle Joe" later told Mr. Smith—

who is the present owner of the Cannon homestead—of this sad farewell.

But Mr. Cannon made a trip back to his native home, after he had risen in the world. Mr. Smith showed him around. "Now, don't you point out things to me," Mr. Cannon said to Mr. Smith, "I want to find them as they were when I was a boy." He found the spring where as a barefoot lad he carried many a bucket of water.

The proposed road would extend from Guilford College through the Guilford Battleground to the site of old Martinsville, four miles from the Battleground, where once lived Governor Martin. It would pass by a big white oak, the top of which, according to tradition, was bitten off by the horse of Lord Cornwallis, leader of the British forces, just before the battle of Guilford Courthouse.
