Farmers should not lose sight of the fact that while good to fine tobacco is selling at very satisfactory prices, the low grades are selling very low--much below their real value. At present prices--\$2 to \$6 per hundred--farmers should pack it away and hold for higher prices. They have nothing to lose and a good chance of heavy gains by holding back these low grades from the market. In six months time low grade tobacco may sell for \$10 to \$15 per hundred--not an unheard of occurrence. The big tobacco companies are making a killing in buying the low grades at present prices. The wise farmer will hold them for better prices.--Reidsville Review.

Virginia Will Have Limited Road Funds

Virginia will have \$1,745,000 for new road construction in 1926, according to tentative allocations announced this week by the highway commission of that state.

In the tentative allocations announced by the commission no provision is made for the Wytheville-Independence road which has been under considerable discussion in this section lately. No funds are provided either for Virginia's part of a bridge over the New River between Virginia and North Carolina just above Sparta on this same route.

\$80,000 is specified as allotted for the building of a bridge across the New River west of Galax, but it is not set out whether or not this

body styled South-western Virginia, Inc., including a dozen or more counties, recently petitioned the Virginia highway commission to put a bridge across the New River at Jackson Ferry. \$80,000 would hardly be sufficient for a concrete bridge there, however. A hearing will be held December 9 at Pulaski on the tentative allocations of funds in the Bristol and Salem districts.

In the allocations for the Salem district provision is made for building the fourteen mile link between Christianburg and Elliston on the Lee Highway, which would complete this highway across Virginia.--Ex.
