

MONEY FOR POOR COUNTIES

\$1,99,960 School Money From State Will Be Divided Among Forty-Seven Counties.

The State Public School Equalization Fund Commission met in Raleigh Thursday and voted to continue for the school year 1926-27 the special appropriation aggregating \$25,428.03, shared in by 47 counties that require a tax rate of 41 cents to meet salary costs for operating their schools for six months.

The special apportionment is in addition to the regular equalizing fund of \$1,641,461.97, which goes to 38 counties and brings the total appropriation to aid counties finance the six-months school term to \$1,726,890.

In making a study of the appropriations for the last year, the commission found that all the counties added by the special fund needed 41 cents for the salary fund, thus complying with the law, and that the boards of education in those counties are living within the budget approved by their boards of county commissioners. It noted, however, that county boards, after approving the amount necessary to run the schools for six months, do not always levy a tax rate sufficient to meet the total approved amount of the budget, although they do levy as much as 41 cents. This makes it necessary for the boards to borrow the necessary amounts which they approved in the budget in voting to continue the special appropriation to 47 counties.

LARGE MAJORITY CARS ARE CHEAP

License Figures Show That Over 500,000 Autos In State Carry \$12.50 License Tax—May Sell 475,000 This Year.

Raleigh, June 2.—By far the great majority of cars in North Carolina are Fords or other very cheap makes, according to the class of license plates, which were purchased at the automobile license bureau of the Department of Revenue during the past fiscal year ending May 31.

The tabulation shows that 392,038 of the 391,038 licenses sold last year were of the \$12.50 class.

The total figures include licenses for trucks, motorcycles, and all motor vehicles. For automobiles alone 375,220 licenses were sold. In addition to the \$12.50 class other classes were as follows: 26,078 licenses in the \$20 class, 3,984 in the \$30 class, and 1,852 in the \$40 class.

A total of 33,508 truck licenses were issued, of which 26,746 were in the \$25 license plate class, while 150 trucks carried \$30 license plates. The remaining license plates were issued to dealers, motorcycles, highway cars, State officials, X plates, and miscellaneous plates.

A total of 475,000 license plates will probably be sold during the year, according to estimates of the license bureau based on the 391,038 sold last year.

MOTORISTS MUST CARRY CARDS

This Is For Purpose of Identification of Driver, Make of Car, Etc.—Appeal To Officers.

Raleigh, June 1.—Further cooperation on the part of all police officers and sheriffs in the state with the automobile license department in the matter of requiring all motorists to carry their identification cards, containing their name, make of car, license number and motor number, is being urged by L. S. Harris, chief inspector of the Theft Bureau. The cards that will be issued this year are on a much better quality of cardboard, and the size is such that it will be convenient to carry in a bill fold and wallet.

Heretofore, the majority of motorists have been careless in carrying their cards because they are rarely asked to produce them. It is quite necessary for them to carry them at all times, however, according to Mr. Harris, as a protection for the individual motorists, and as a means of enabling the police and county officers in locating and recovering stolen automobiles.

"Take, for instance, an officer in hunting down a stolen car. The license plates, very often, have been changed, and it becomes necessary to stop a number of cars. If the driver has his identification card, and the license number and engine number on the card check with those on the car, it immediately becomes apparent to the officer, and the driver is permitted to proceed without further questioning.

"If, however, he does not have his identification it may become very embarrassing to him to explain, even tho the car may be properly his. Hence it is of the utmost importance that drivers of all cars generally be educated to the point where they realize the necessity for carrying cards at all times. It will save them embarrassment and will materially assist the officers over state in their work.
