

Tobacco Paid Well For Seed Treatment

Raleigh, Jan. 15.—It pays to treat tobacco seed before planting so that plant disease spores may be killed.

"Last year, sixty-six farmers of Columbus county treated enough of their tobacco seed to plant 1,000 acres. The seed were also cleaned so that only the best were planted.

After the tobacco seed was cleaned, a treatment with a formaldehyde solution using the method of the manual by a pair of hands is then given.

But this is only one disease preventative recommended by G. W. Felt, plant disease specialist. He states that a new location should be found for the seed bed especially if there was disease in the tobacco last year and it is impossible to sterilize the old bed.

By using these simple preventive measures, tobacco diseases may be kept in control and a better quality of seed produced this season.
