The contest for Sheriff on the Republican side commanded most attention, and J. R. Nunn defeated Sheriff Dunlap by 434 votes.

Mrs. R. H. Morefield won the nomination for House of Representatives on the Democratic side over three opponents, E. C. Gann, G. W. Smith and J. S. Garner. She received 26 more than half of the entire
