**Practical Dishes For Busy Days**

We suggest these recipes for use on busy days when dinner must be prepared at the last minute. When you have used them you will think that they are good dishes for any day!

**Chili Con Carne**—Brown 1 pound ground beef in skillet with 2 tablespoons fat and finely chopped onion. Season with salt and pepper, add 1 medium can Oven Baked Red Kidney Beans. Simmer for few minutes, add 1 small can Tomato Soup. Add in teaspoon Chili powder, cook for ten minutes. Serve with baked or boiled potatoes. (Some people prefer to omit the Chili powder).

**Sausages with Kidney Beans**—Brown Sausage by a skillet. Pour over it 1 medium can of red kidney beans. Heat for ten minutes. Add 1 small can Tomato Soup. Add in teaspoon Chili powder, cook for ten minutes. Serve with baked or boiled potatoes. (Some people prefer to omit the Chili powder).

**Ham with Ketchup Sauce**—Brown thick slice of ham in skillet. Add 1/2 cup ketchup, 1/2 cup onion juice, 1/2 cup tomato ketchup and pour over evenly after folding.

**Scalloped Eggs in Cream Sauce**—4 hard-boiled eggs; 2 tablespoons butter; 1/2 cup cream; 1/2 cup milk; 1/2 cup onion juice; 1/2 cup tomato ketchup; 1/2 cup butter; 1/2 cup milk.

**Tomato Sauce**—Melt 2 tablespoons butter in a saucepan, add 2 tablespoons flour and stir until well blended. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt and a dash of pepper, onion juice and 1 cup milk. Stir until thick, add 1/2 cup Tomato Ketchup and pour over evenly after folding.

**Mock Chicken a la King**—Melt 2 tablespoons butter in saucepan and fry in it for 5 minutes 1 can mushrooms or 1/2 pound fresh mushrooms cut in pieces. Add 4 tablespoons flour and stir until well blended. Add 2 cups milk or cream, and 1 tablespoon butter. Cook until thick, stirring constantly. Season with salt, pepper and Worcestershire Sauce. Add 3 chopped, hard-cooked eggs and 1/2 cup stuffed olives chopped. Serve in patty shells or on slices of buttered toast. Garnish with slices of stuffed olive.

**How Do You Choose Your Lunch?**

Whether the noon-day meal is eaten at home or in a cafeteria or restaurant, outside the home, it is an important meal and should be carefully chosen. Lunches which do not contain the proper foods, eaten day after day, may seriously affect health.

A large city high school, in conducting a "Better Lunch" campaign for its students, suggests the following simple chart as a guide for choosing a well balanced lunch. This plan may be followed in selecting a lunch away from home or in preparing the luncheon in the home.

As a basis, choose one or more of these:  
A hot cream soup  
A vegetable  
A meat substitute, such as a bean, or egg or cheese dish  
A substantial salad

Add bread and butter, a beverage and a simple dessert such as fruit or custard pudding.

The following are recipes for substantial and appetizing dishes which may be used in planning lunches according to the above luncheon plan.

**Luncheon Salad**—Heat one medium can of tomato soup to boiling point, add one tablespoon plain gelatin soaked in 1/2 cup cold water. Add two packages Philadelphia Cream Cheese and 1 cup mayonnaise dressing. Cool and add 1/2 cup chopped celery, 1/2 cup chopped olives, and 1 green pepper chopped. Mold in large mold or in individual molds and serve on nest of lettuce garnished with a sprig of mayonnaise dressing and a sliced olive.

cup tomato ketchup. This dish makes an excellent substitute for meat.

**Omelet with Tomato Sauce**—4 eggs; 4 tablespoons hot water; salt and pepper; butter or butter substitute. Beat egg whites until stiff. Beat yolks until thick and lemon colored, beat into them hot water and add salt and pepper. Cut and fold together yolks and stiffly beaten whites. Melt enough butter in a skillet to grease the bottom and sides of pan. Turn the egg mixture into pan and cook over slow fire until fluffy and light brown underneath, then place in oven until top is dry. Touch top of omelet lightly with the finger and if egg does not stick to the finger the omelet is done. Do not overcook or it will shrink or be tough. Loosen edges of omelet, slip a spatula or flexible knife under the side next to the handle of the pan, fold one half over the other and press slightly to make it stay in place, slip onto a hot plate and serve at once with tomato sauce.

**Tomato Sauce**—Melt 2 tablespoons butter in a saucepan, add 2 tablespoons flour and stir until well blended. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt and a dash of pepper, onion juice and 1 cup milk. Stir until thick, add 1/2 cup Tomato Ketchup and pour over evenly after folding.

**Scalloped Eggs in Cream Sauce**—4 hard-boiled eggs; 2 tablespoons butter; 1/2 cup cream; 1/2 cup milk; 1/2 cup onion juice; 1/2 cup tomato ketchup; 1/2 cup butter; 1/2 cup milk.

**Mock Chicken a la King**—Melt 2 tablespoons butter in saucepan and fry in it for 5 minutes 1 can mushrooms or 1/2 pound fresh mushrooms cut in pieces.
