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BAILEY'S MAJORITY IS AROUND 70,000

Carried Stokes Over Senator Simmons By 643—Latter Admits Defeat and Will Not Run As Independent—More Interest Shown In Contest Than Any Since Simmons and Kitchin Were Candidates For Same Office—Pritchard Will Likely Be Bailey's Opponent In Election This Fall.

J. W. Bailey, of Raleigh, defeated Senator F. M. Simmons by a huge majority in Saturday's primary. While a few counties have not sent in complete returns the majority at present is around 70,000. Stokes county gave Bailey more than 600 majority.

The contest throughout the State was said to have been the most intense since the famous Kitchin-Simmons contest for the same office a good many years since.

Present indications are that Geo. M. Pritchard, Republican, of Asheville, will be Bailey's opponent in the fall election, he having defeated Tucker, Butler and Dorsett, Republican candidates for the place.

There had been intimations that Senator Simmons might run as an independent in view of the fact that Bailey entered the campaign with the avowed

intention of "punishing" Simmons for his refusal in 1928 to support Alfred E. Smith for president. The senator yesterday put a damper on this with the statement that such a prediction was "ridiculous."

Senator Simmons entered the senate in 1900, defeating Marion Butler of Clinton, then senator from North Carolina, who was elected on the republican ticket, for many years Simmons was virtual dictator of the democratic party and to his refusal to support Smith many attribute the fact that North Carolina went for Herbert Hoover in 1928.

Bailey, who was nominated over Simmons, is 56 years old and was born in Warrenton. He is a graduate of Wake Forest college and an attorney. He has been prominent in politics for many years.

JOHN W. HALL GETS NOMINATION

Republican Candidate For Solicitor In This District Gets More Votes Than Other Two Men.

The Republican nomination for solicitor in this district goes to Attorney J. W. Hall, of Danbury, according to official returns from the three counties of the district—Stokes, Guilford and Davidson.

The other candidates for this office were Henry R. Stanley and Jas. T. Allen, of Greensboro, both of whom made rather extensive campaigns in Stokes. A. C. Davis, who was

a candidate for the same office, withdrew in favor of Mr. Stanley just before the primary, though he received some votes in each of the counties, having withdrawn after his name had been printed on the tickets.

Mr. Hall received letters this week from both Mr. Stanley and Mr. Allen, in which they conceded his nomination and congratulated him upon his victory.

County Boards Are Re-nominated

The Present Boards of County Commissioners and Of Education Won Over New Ones Suggested On Both Boards—E. W. Carroll and J. C. Craig Recommended By Voters For Highway Commissioners.

The three present members of the Stokes county Board of Commissioners—Jacob Fulton, R. S. Helsabeck and Rufus O. Wood, were re-nominated in Saturday's primary by large majorities. Carl T. Mabe and Otis Dillon were also candidates, but were defeated.

J. R. Forest, R. B. Hutcherson and J. W. Priddy were again recommended for ap-

pointment as members of the Board of Education. John L. Christian and Edwin Kiser were the other candidates for the office.

As members of the county highway commission E. W. Carroll, and J. C. Craig were endorsed by the voters. Other candidates were Moir Hawkins and W. P. Ray.

J. D. HUMPHREYS IS NOMINEE

Receives Highest Vote Of Three Candidates For Judge In 12th District—A. Wayland Cooke, Second Highest, Announces That He Will Not Ask For Second Primary—Mr. Humphreys Gets Practically All Democratic Votes In Stokes.

In Saturday's primary Hon. John D. Humphreys, Democratic candidate for Judge in the 12th District, received practically all the Democratic votes in Stokes county, led the other two candidates, Messrs. Cooke and Hoyle in Davidson county, and received a handsome vote in Guilford county.

Greensboro, June 10. — A. Wayland Cooke, second in the primary, announced this morning he will not contest in a second primary with J. D. Humphreys, of Danbury, for the nomination as judge of the Twelfth Judicial District, composed of Guilford, Stokes and Davidson counties. His statement is herewith given:

"After consulting with my friends over the district and considering particularly the political expediency of the situation, I am of the opinion that it would be unwise for me to ask for a second primary as a candidate for the nomination for judge of this district.

"I am assured that there are enough votes in Guilford coun-

ty to give me the nomination, but if I were nominated by the votes obtained principally in Greensboro the interests of the Democratic party might be seriously jeopardized in the fall election. I am unwilling to put my personal ambitions above the good of the Democratic party in the district. I therefore announce that I do not demand a second primary. I accept with good grace the results of the first primary, and pledge my whole-hearted support to the entire Democratic ticket in the fall election.

"I am exceedingly grateful to my friends in the district for the splendid vote that they gave me, and I take this opportunity to publicly express my deep appreciation."

J. R. Nunn Leads In Sheriffs Contest

M. J. Fagg Is Second In Race With E. R. Nelson and Jesse B. Priddy Third and Fourth Respectively—There Will Be No Second Primary Between Two High Candidates.
