

While officiating as priest this good news came to him. From verse 13 the Implication is that Zacharias had been praying definitely about this mat-While he burned incense, which is typical of prayer, the multitudes without were praying.

Characteristics of the child (vv. 15-17).

(1) Shall be great in the sight of the Lord (y, 15).

Though the people did not greatly esteem him, he was highly esteemed by the Lord.

(2) Shall drink neither wine nor strong drink (v. 15).

He was to be a Nazarite, separating himself from sensuous things and dedicating himself unto the Lord (Numbers 6:1-6).

(3) Shall be filled with the Holy Ghost (v. 15).

The energy of the divine Spirit was needed to enable him to lead the people to repentance (v, 16).

(4) Shall go in the spirit and pow-er of Elijah (v. 17).

In this power he was to prepare the people for the coming of the Savior, and the salvation which he was to ring.
