

PERSONNEL OF NEW LEGISLATURE

REPUBLICANS WILL BE VERY SCARCE IN THE 1933 SESSION OF NORTH CAROLINA GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

Only five members of the 1931 Senate, only ten members of the 1931 General Assembly and only 17 members who have had former legislative experience in either house of the North Carolina legislature will be among the 59 State Senators in the 1933 General Assembly, a check of the members elected last week, made by LeRoy Martin, Senate clerk, shows.

On the House side, however, 59 of the 1931 body will be back and 55 of the number, with possibly one or two additions, have had former legislative experience, either in the Senate or the House side.

Shake-up in Senate

While the turnover in both Senate and House is larger than usual, the big shake-up is in the Senate side, due in large measure to the rotation of senators from one county to another in the districts having two or more counties. This plan, too, does not make for the best in legislative practice, since a senator needs often about one session to be of the most value to his district and State.

The five Senators who were members of the 1931 legislature and will be back for the 1933 session are W. G. Clark, Tarboro, Fourth district; J. W. Hensdale, Raleigh, 13th district; Allen H. Gwyn, Reidsville, 17th district; Hayden Clement, Salisbury, 21st district, and H. Grady Rankin, Gastonia, 26th district.

The five members of the 1931 House who will be on the Senate side for 1933 are A. D. MacLain, Washington, N. C., Second district; Dr. T. W. M. Long, Roanoke Rapids, Fourth district; Capus M. Wainright, High Point, 17th district; W. O. Burgin, Lenoir, 18th district, and Robert M. Hance, Winston-Salem, 22nd district.

The seven other senators who have had previous legislative experience in House or Senate, are L. E. Griffin, Winston, First district; C. L. Bailey, Roper, Second; Larry I. Moore, New Bern, Seventh; Paul D. Grady, Kenner, Bladen; W. A. Brown, Rocky Point, Ninth; L. M. Blue, Gibson, 14th, and P. T. McNeill, West Jefferson, 20th. The only two Republican Senators, J. M. Blackburn, Wilkesboro, 24th, and George L. Greene, Bakersville, 30, are new men.

Season Has Arrived For Work In Woods

Now that the season has arrived for work in the woodlands of North Carolina it should be the thought of every landowner to improve his growing stand rather than to cut and destroy ruthlessly, believes R. W. Graeber, extension forester at State College.

When cutting the firewood, select those trees which will not make lumber, he says especially if such trees are interfering with the growth of well-shaped white, red, post and black oaks, yellow poplar, ash gum or pine. The thick stands of pines may need thinning. From here one can harvest his firewood, pulpwood or a few saw logs.

"I think we could well summarize the kind of trees to cut," says Mr. Graeber. "Cut the crooked trees, the short, bushy-crowned ones, the unsound, diseased or rotten trees, the poor timber trees, and some additional trees where the wood is too thick. On the other hand save the straight trees; those which are tall and thin; the second growth; the good timber trees and always save enough to have a good timber stand."

Mr. Graeber says the 279,798 farms in North Carolina average 64.5 acres each, of which 28.7 acres or 46 per cent, is in woodland. If this woodland is protected from fire and handled in the commonsense way suggested, it will produce an average of one cord an acre annually. This means that the average farmer of North Carolina may have an annual crop of 30 cords of wood. This is enough to supply him with fuel, to make repairs on his farm buildings and allow him 10 or 12 cords a year for sale.

If careful thinking and selective cutting is followed, the crop may be increased by 50 per cent, additional, Graeber says.

RUBBING a teaspoonful of sugar along with salt and pepper into a steak will improve the flavor. The sugar caramelizes on the outside holding in the juices which gives the meat added nutritional value.
