MEETING CLOSES AT GLADE VALLEY

JANUARY AID \$3,528 FOR STOKES

THIS AMOUNT WAS PAID FROM R. F. C. FUNDS TO 236 LABORERS—IN THE STATE MORE THAN 95,000 MEN WERE ENGAGED AND RECEIVED \$750,000 — MECKLENBURG THE BIGGEST PENSIONER.

In the month of January, 236 Stokes citizens received \$3,528 wages for work done on school grounds, highway repairing and beautification, and other forms of construction.

These figures are furnished the Reporter from the Governor's Office of Relief at Raleigh, which is dispensing R. F. C. funds in North Carolina for the aid of unemployment, and which during the month of January paid out more than \$750,000 to 95,686 men.

The above figures indicate that about two-thirds of the heads of destitute families in the State were working for the aid which they received.

It is interesting to note from the figures which we have received from the Governor's office, that many other counties in the State are receiving far more help than Stokes, showing that destitution is widespread.

For instance in Anson county 2,800 men were worked and were paid \$16,622.

Forsyth paid out \$21,677 to 1739 workers.

Guilford paid \$39,080 to 2395 workers.

Mecklenburg, \$38,087 to 2500 laborers.

Rockingham worked 847 men, and the payroll was \$12,994.

Surry, \$9,709 to 1952 laborers.

Yadkin, 402 workers, payroll \$3,282.
