## STOKES SALARIES BILL CONSIDERED

SENATOR SPARGER AND REPRESENTATIVE PHILLIPS URGED TO ENACT LEGISLATION CONCERNING THE PAY OF COUNTY OFFICERS—MATTER IN ABEYANCE YET—BILL MAY LEAVE DISCRETION WITH COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

It is learned that a number of citizens of the county have been to Raleigh in conference with Senator Sparger and Representative Phillips with regard to the enactment of legislation reducing the salaries of the county officers of Stokes.

The officers who would be affected in the event of a salary cut would probably be Sheriff J. John Taylor, Register of Deeds B. P. Bailey, Clerk of the Court J. Watt Tuttle, Auditor Frank Stone, and indirectly County Superintendent of Schools J. C. Carson, though he is paid by the State. The compensations of members of the Board of County Commissioners and of the Board of Education would also be involved in the retrenchment proposed.

## STATE PLANTERS BANK IS OPEN

WALNUT COVE INSTITUTION DOING UNRESTRICTED BUSINESS—DEPOSITS FAR EXCEEDED WITHDRAWALS—PEOPLE URGED TO KEEP THEIR MONEY IN CIRCULATION, WITH ASSURANCE OF SAFETY.

The State Planters Bank of Walnut Cove, which has been observing a two-weeks holiday in accordance with the general order of the President of the United States closing all the banks of the nation, is now wide open.

T. J. Pyerly, President of the State Planters, last week received from the State Banking Department at Raleigh authorization to open his doors again for unrestricted business. The State banking authorities are acting in co-operation with the Federal government.

On the first day of its resumption of business, deposits far exceeded withdrawals at the State Planters, which shows the confidence of the public in this splendid institution and indicating that the public accepts the virtual guarantee of the safety of their money when the government is providing heavy penalties for hoarding, at the same time that it allows only those banks to open and receive deposits which it says, by its action are safe and entitled to the patronage of the public.

It is known that there are thousands of dollars of gold among the people and that as soon as the public thoroughly understands the specie must come out of hiding and be deposited in the banks, it will show itself, and go into circulation again.

## New Fishing Law Has Passed House

The bill to make it unlawful to seine, trap or in any way catch fish in the Dan, Mayo and Smith rivers in Rockingham and Stokes counties, except with hook and line and rod and reel, has finally been passed in the House and ordered sent to the Senate. The measure was introduced by Representatives Binford and Meehan, of Rockingham, and Phillips of Stokes, and Smith's river was added in an amendment.

The bill permits residents of Rockingham and Stokes counties to fish with hook and line without securing a license to fish.
