MANY FARMERS CAN'T GET HELP

APPLICATIONS FOR FEDERAL FARM LOANS TURNED DOWN, PREVENTS GROWERS FROM SECURING FERTILIZER—GOVERNMENT TAKES SECURITY FOR OLD BALANCES, BUT REFUSES NEW LOANS—MATTER BROUGHT TO ATTENTION OF WASHINGTON GOVERNMENT.

Many farmers, whose applications for federal loans have been turned down by the government, will be unable to make 1933 crop. In this case only continued assistance through Red Cross or other direct relief agencies, may prevent serious suffering.

The above facts and complaint have been brought to the attention of the Danbury Reporter by quite a number of citizens.

It is stated that the reasons assigned by the government, through its agents, for refusal of further relief in most cases is that the growers have not settled unpaid balances for 1931 or 1932, or both.

Farmers who make the above complaint also allege that they were induced to execute mortgages on their 1933 crops on the expectation of getting loans, but that after tying up the only security they could avail themselves of, they are left in the precarious position now of being unable to get help from any other source. No supply merchant or fertilizer dealer is willing to make advances on a crop already mortgaged.

The Reporter's informants advise that the federal farm loan committee in the county is composed of Luther Mitchell, of Walnut Cove; P. O. Fry of Pinnacle, and R. B. Hutcherson of Sandy Ridge.

The non-resident inspector or supervisor of federal loans for Stokes is H. S. Anderson, who is understood to have the last word in loans, and whose O. K. is necessary to secure the granting of the loans in Washington.

It is understood that complaint is being made through Congressman Frank Hancock and Senator Robt. Reynolds as to the situation in the county with reference to crop loans.

WALNUT COVE'S TOWN ELECTION

INTERESTING CONTEST BOOKED FOR MAY 1 — THE ISSUES — OVER 1300 FARM LOANS IN COUNTY FOR 1933—BEAUTIFUL EASTER PROGRAM — MARRIAGES OF POPULAR COUPLES — OTHER COVE NEWS.

Walnut Cove, April 17.

The town of Walnut Cove will hold its regular annual election on the first Tuesday in May, the registration books having closed on the 22 day of April, 1933. There appears to be a great deal of interest being manifested in this election. Heretofore, no opposition in the election of a Board of Town Commissioners has been encountered. The old Board, composed of Messrs. J. L. Mitchell, Mayor, with H. H. Davis, R. L. Vaughn, C. R. Hutcherson, and E. F. Michael, is for re-election. The program for the old Board, if re-elected, is a more strict economy in the government of the town, and the purchase of all outstanding bonds as fast as the funds are available.

It is understood that the new candidates for election, composed of Messrs. J. C. Hutchison, Mayor, with W. F. Marshall, W. M. Fulp, E. F. Michael, and O. M. Southern, stand for the elimination of all expenses of the town in the way of clerk hire, room rent and other expenses, except the actual upkeep and maintenance of the town's equipment and systems of water and sewer. That, it is understood, would make a saving of from \$800 to \$1500 annually; and also the borrowing of funds sufficient to take up all the outstanding bonds of the town at greatly reduced values.

Mr. H. S. Anderson, the Government Agent in Stokes County, informs us that he hopes to complete the making out of loans during the week ending April 22nd. Loans in date in Stokes County total 1,380; and approximately 200 more are expected during this week, according to Mr. Anderson's estimate. The loans during 1933 will average approximately \$65. In Forsyth County, it is said, there has been filed with the County Agent only 461 applications, with an average of \$57. Comparing the figures of the number of applications from farmers in the two counties, it appears that all Stokes County farmers are in greater need of finances than the farmers in the adjoining county.

A beautiful Easter program was presented by the various societies of the Baptist church last Friday evening, consisting of speeches, songs, recitations. The pastor, Rev. O. E. A LAKE AT THE COUNTY HOME

ADDITIONAL PROJECTS LAUNCHED BY LAWRENCE MACRAE—ROAD TO HANGING ROCK WILL BE SURVEYED BY STATE—MOVE TO INCLUDE STOKES IN DANIEL BOONE NATIONAL FOREST PARK.

It is proposed to build a lake in the flat lands adjacent to the County Home, providing a sheet of water covering some 20 acres, affording fishing, boating, and bathing for the citizens of Stokes county.

This is an additional and very interesting item in the series of projects being launched by Lawrence MacRae in the interest of the upbuilding of the county, and to aid in the development of our resources largely at the expense of Federal agencies.

Mr. MacRae was in Danbury Friday placing on exhibition a map of the proposed road to Hanging Rock, which it is estimated will carry a grade of only about 10 per cent, and may be constructed at a very reasonable cost. The elevation of Hanging Rock is about 3,100 feet, much higher than Asheville.

The project of the Hanging Rock development is very feasible. State Chairman Jeffress of the Highway Department, is expected to have the road surveyed at an early date.

In enlarging his projects for the development of the resources of the county, Mr. MacRae includes a chain of lakes to furnish fishing and boating and other practical or pleasurable pursuits for citizens of the county, and for visitors and tourists who will be willing to pay a reasonable fee for the privileges incident thereto.

Mr. MacRae is working earnestly also to have Stokes county included in the proposed Daniel Boone National Forest Park, and to furnish the extreme eastern gateway of this vast reservation.
