POSTMASTERS TO HOLD OUT TERMS

POSTMASTER GENERAL FARLEY ANNOUNCES POLICY OF FAIRNESS TOWARD REPUBLICAN OFFICEROLDERS—STOKES INCUMBENCIES.

In consequence of the decision of Postmaster-General Farley to allow postmasters to serve out their unexpired terms, there will probably be no new postmasters appointed in Stokes county for some time to come. This means that Postmaster W. G. Petree at Danbury, Postmistress Lewellyn at Walnut Cove, and other officials of Stokes county who are holding their offices by virtue of appointments received under the Hoover administration will be allowed to continue their incumbencies until their respective terms expire, unless in case that charges might be filed. The term of the Danbury postmaster will not expire until probably in 1934.

Study Food Supply For Farm Home

Two years of low prices for farm produce has caused North Carolina farm women to study the question of an adequate and balanced food supply for their families as never before. In 1932, Miss Mary Thomas, food specialist for the agricultural extension service at State College, says 22,089 women and 12,280 club girls were enrolled in food studies through their organized clubs. There were 16,438 women and 7,349 girls who completed the series of studies as outlined. Especially did these women and girls emphasize a continuation of the live-at-home program and adopt plans leading to the production of adequate foodstuffs on their home farms. "In spite of this," says Miss Thomas, "there are still too many farms in our State which do not produce an adequate amount and variety of food for the family. This is indicated by the prevalence of such nutritional diseases as pellagra, constipation and anemia due to the lack of proper food and information about the relation of food to health. Our club women, however, are studying food selection, better preparation of the food available and more skillful meal planning." The home demonstration club women have four ultimate goals in view, says Miss Thomas. These are: An adequate supply and variety of foods produced on every farm. Every member of the family practicing good food selection habits and free from ailments indicating faulty diet. Every family having meals well-planned to meet body needs, foods well-cooked and attractively served. Every family making a food budget and keeping ample records of food costs.

SANDY SISK MEETS HIS DEATH

SHOT AND KILLED AT MAYODAN EARLY TUESDAY MORNING BY WALL—DEAD MAN SON OF J. E. SISK, FORMERLY OF STOKES. News reached Danbury Tuesday of the fatal shooting of Sandy Sisk by a young man named Wall, at Mayodan about 4 o'clock Tuesday morning. Several shots were fired by Wall, who woke Sisk at his home in the early morning. Sisk died about 3 hours later at a Winston-Salem hospital. No further particulars could be learned. Sisk was a son of J. E. Sisk, who formerly lived in Stokes, but who removed to Rockingham some 25 years ago. Wall is understood to be a grandson of S. G. Wall of Madison County, Stokes county. Sisk was one of the parties implicated in the Miller killing near Madison several years ago.

LATER REPORT

Since the above was written additional details of the killing have been received. It seems that the shooting occurred at the home of Nat Martin in Mayodan. Sisk was shot no less than 5 times, one bullet penetrating his forehead, another pierced a lung, and a third went into his abdomen. Two other shots took effect in his body at other places. The affair appears to have been the result of a drunken brawl. Sisk was killed by his own revolver. During the fight between the two men, their guns became exchanged. Wall had several holes through his clothing, but was not hit. Both men had bad reputations. Sisk had served a term in the pen for his connection with the Ziegler affair, in which Hardy and Sandy Sisk were charged with the murder of Policeman Ziegler of Mayodan. LIQUIDATING AGENT'S REPORT OF OPERATIONS OF THE BANK OF STOKES COUNTY

A complete report of the operations of the Bank of Stokes County, which closed in November 1930, has recently been filed by Gurney P. Hood, Commissioner of Banks, covering the entire year of 1932. This report compiled by the banking department was approved Tuesday of last week by Presiding Judge, A. M. Stack, in open court and is now recorded in the office of the Clerk of Superior Court. Receipts from interest, rents and miscellaneous income amounts to \$8,474.41, while the total operating expense is \$8,697.99, leaving an operating loss of \$123.58, only which is a very creditable showing and indicates that the closed bank is being operated and liquidated by the banking department in an economical manner. At the close of business December 31, 1932 the following schedule of resources and liabilities is shown by the report:

The report also shows a reduction in loans during the year of \$205,206.65 and an increase in real estate owned of \$147,518.33 together with an item of \$7,306.87 for loss in assets charged off. The bank's liquidation is now in charge of Mr. L. L. Aycock, who succeeded Mr. S. J. Hinsdale during the fall months. He is being assisted by Mr. L. D. Debnam and Mrs. L. E. Strader. This official force also have in charge the liquidation of the Farmers Bank of Madison, the Bank of Summerfield and the Rural Hall Bank & Trust Co, all of which liquidation is being handled thru the same office thereby eliminating considerable expense in the joint handling of the bank's affairs.
