Walnut Cove Veneer Company Alleged Bankrupt

A petition that the Walnut Cove Veneer Company be declared a bankrupt was filed in federal district court at Greensboro by the North Carolina Bank and Trust Company, claiming \$5,000, and the Bank of Stokes, through Bank Commissioner Gurney P. Hood, claiming \$125.00.

It is asserted the firm is insolvent and has demonstrated insolvency in permitting a judgment against it to remain unpaid over 60 days. The concern has conducted a big veneer producing plant at Walnut Cove.

BLUE MOLD HITS STOKES COUNTY

DESTRUCTIVE DISEASE TO TOBACCO PLANTS REPORTED FROM SEVERAL SECTIONS—MOIR HAWKINS TELLS HOW TO COMBAT IT—MOIR ALMOST BLINDED BY ACCIDENT.

Moir Hawkins, a prominent farmer and large fertilizer dealer, of Sandy Ridge, who was in town Monday, advises the Reporter that the dangerous tobacco plant disease known as "blue mold" is quite prevalent in several sections of the county.

"Blue mold" is a disorder which attacks the plants in the bud, causing them to shrivel up and die. It has caused much damage in eastern North Carolina, but has heretofore been almost unknown in this county.

Mr. Hawkins says that if the plants are not too thick in the bud and that if they are treated liberally with nitrate of soda, they will quickly outgrow the ravages of the disease.

Moir almost lost the sight of his right eye the other day, when cutting some brush in his pasture land. A falling branch struck his eye, injuring it to such extent that he was practically blind for 3 weeks. He is now much improved, under the treatment of a physician.

ODELL MABE IS SERIOUSLY CUT

WENT THROUGH WINDSHIELD WHEN FORD HIT THE BANK—ACCIDENT AT DANBURY SATURDAY NIGHT—CAR RUINED.

Saturday night was a good night for accidents.

A Ford driven by young Odell Mabe, son of John Ed Mabe, in which Odell Mabe, son of Powell Mabe, was riding, went off in a tangent near E. R. Leake's store in Danbury, hit a bank and was well nigh demolished. Odell Mabe was hurled through the windshield, and received dangerous cuts in his throat. He was given first aid treatment, and hurried to a physician.

It is not known just why John Ed's son, who was under the steering wheel, should have left the side of the highway and wrecked his machine in the hole by the side of the road, but he evidently lost control of the car.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT AT SANDY RIDGE

JIM LEAKE BADLY HURT WHEN TRUCK HE WAS DRIVING COLLIDED WITH ROADSTER DRIVEN BY BILL CORN—LEAKE RUSHED TO STUART HOSPITAL—BOTH MACHINES DEMOLISHED.

At Sandy Ridge Saturday night about 8 o'clock Jim Leake was seriously hurt when the truck he was driving collided with a T. model Ford roadster steered by Bill Corn. Five men aboard the truck and three riding in the roadster were thrown out and painfully bruised, but none was seriously hurt except Leake.

The truck, which was owned by R. E. Leake, was damaged probably by 50 per cent. The roadster was demolished.

Immediately after the accident occurred Jim Leake, the driver of the truck, suffering with cuts and abrasions about the head, and in a dangerous condition, was rushed to the Stuart, Va. hospital. At last accounts he was not expected to live.

LIST YOUR TAXES

Tax listing for the County of Stokes will start Monday, May 1st, 1933. All taxpayers should list their property early and evade the penalty. Failure to list or attempt to evade just taxation will subject taxpayer to a specific penalty of 25 per cent of total tax, and all persons who are liable for poll tax and fail to give themselves in, and all who own property and fail to list it, will be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction, fined or imprisoned.
