House Passes Home Loan Bill

Washington, April 28. — The Administration's \$2,400,000,000 home mortgage refinancing bill was passed today by the House without material change. The vote was 383 to 4. It now goes to the Senate.

Aided by Republicans and their conservative wing, the Democratic leaders succeeded in defeating an amendment by Representative Cochran (Democrat) of Missouri to authorize direct cash loans to home owners instead of refinancing through bond issues. The teller vote was 133 to 78.

Opponents of this amendment said it would wreck the bill and make it impossible to become law. They contended that the \$22,000,000,000 of outstanding home mortgage indebtedness would be unloaded on the Government.

PROVISIONS OF FARM BILL

ITS TERMS GIVE ROOSEVELT REVOLUTIONARY POWER OVER MONEY.

Washington.—The inflation relief bill passed by the Senate is one of the most extraordinary and sweeping measures ever adopted by an American Congress.

It gives President Roosevelt iron control over the nation's money. It permits—but does not order—expansion of billions of dollars in currency.

It places the secretary of agriculture in control of farm production in a frankly experimental attempt to eliminate excess output and raise crop prices.

It provides for government refinancing of farm mortgages to the extent of \$2,000,000,000.

Detailed provisions of the bill follow:

- 1. Grants the President authority: 1. To enter into agreement with the Federal Reserve System whereby the latter, to expand credit, could buy federal obligations to the extent of \$2,000,000,000. 2. If this operation proved inadequate to order issuance of \$3,000,000,000 in new money, to be retired by a sinking fund at 4 per cent. annually. 3. To alter the gold content of the dollar within 50 per cent. range. 4. To order free coinage of silver at a ratio to be fixed by him. 5. To accept \$2,000,000,000 in silver in payment of foreign debts and to issue silver certificates against that bullion.

Grants Secretary of Agriculture Wallace authority:

- 1. To reduce farm acreage and production through application of the cotton option, domestic allotment and land leasing plans, remunerating farmers for such reduction by bounties and rentals. 2. To impose processing taxes designed to raise prices until farm purchasing power reaches a "parity" measured in terms of what the farmer must buy. Proceeds of the taxes to be paid to farmers in the bounties and rentals. 3. To guarantee the farmer a "reasonable profit" on the domestically consumed portion of his crop. 4. To license processors and distributors to enforce fair practice. 5. To make marketing agreements with producers, processors and distributors.

CREDIT SECTION

- 1. Provides for a \$2,000,000,000 issue of 4 per cent. Federal Land Bank bonds, interest to be guaranteed by the government. 2. Authorizes the land banks to purchase first mortgages or to exchange the bonds for them, on a

basis of 'unpaid balance' or 50 per cent. of the appraised land values plus 20 per cent. of improvement value.

3. To reduce interest on outstanding land bank mortgages loans to 4 1/2 per cent.

4. Direct loans to farmers in districts not covered by national farm loan associations.

5. Provides for gradual liquidation of joint stock land banks. Reconstruction Finance Corporation authorized to lend \$100,000,000 to these banks, conditioned on agreements to reduce interest rates to 5 per cent. and suspend foreclosures for two years.

6. Extends \$200,000,000 in Reconstruction Finance Corporation credit to farmers settling down their indebtedness under the recent bankruptcy law.

7. Reconstruction Finance Corporation loans of \$100,000,000 for refinancing indebtedness of drainage, irrigation and levee districts.

8. Treasury subscriptions of \$50,000,000 to be paid in surplus of the Federal Land banks to facilitate operation of the program.
