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PROGRAM OF STOKES BUILDING

THIS COUNTY SHOULD SHARE FAIRLY IN THE VAST EXPENSES BEING LAUNCHED BY THE INDUSTRIAL RECOVERY ACT. NOW LAW, PLENTY OF MONEY NOW AVAILABLE FOR ALL DEMANDS.

It is probable that the work of surfacing the Buck Island-Virginia line highway will be started at once, as plenty of money is now available.

Work on this road, the grading of which has been completed for several weeks, was temporarily suspended by the Federal Bureau of Road Building to start the reforestation program.

But now the Reporter is advised by Chairman E. B. Jeffress, of the State Highway and Public Works Commission, that large amounts of federal money will immediately be received by the State of North Carolina under the terms of the Industrial Recovery Act just passed by Congress.

Specifically the State will receive \$11,000,000 to be used in highway construction, and out of this fund it is supposed that funds will be available for the following road work in Stokes county:

1. Surfacing the Buck Island-Virginia line highway;
2. Surfacing the highway from Meadows to Germanton.
3. Building a new road from Piedmont Springs, on No. 89, via Moore's Vade Mecum, Rockhouse, to Pilot Mountain.
4. Building and surfacing road from McHone's garage, near Virginia line, via Sandy Ridge and DeLard, to Pine Hall.
5. Building new bridge over Town Fork at Walnut Cove.

Federal funds to be allocated to the above projects will be extended through the channels of the State Highway and Public Works Commission.

It is understood that the Hanging Rock and Seven Island road projects will be constructed through the R. F. C. agencies under the head of relieving unemployment. As soon as these projects have been whipped into shape so that they may be officially recognized as public roads they will be taken over by the State authorities. At that time they may be eligible for federal aid.

Death Of Joseph Martin

Joseph Martin, a prominent citizen and farmer of Peter's Creek township, died at his home near Lawsonville. He was aged about 75 or 80.

Mr. Martin was a good citizen, and will be missed in his community. He was the father of Roy Martin and Mrs. Mrs. Shores Hall.

CARR STEVENS IS BADLY HURT

DISTRESSING ACCIDENT TO FORTY-NINE YEAR OLD FARMER NEAR COLFAX, GUILFORD COUNTY -- CRUSHED AND MANGLED BY RUNAWAY TEAM, MAY NOT RECOVER--WAS ENGAGED IN HAULING UP WHEAT--RELATIVE OF P. M. STEVENS AT DANBURY.

Carr Stevens, 49, formerly of Stokes, was badly injured near Colfax, Guilford county, Friday, when the team he was driving, while hauling wheat, ran away. Stevens was thrown from the wagon and was dragged a distance of nearly 100 yards, the wheel of the wagon passing over his body. Thirteen of his ribs were broken, his lung pierced, his right eye destroyed, his right shoulder broken. He was picked up unconscious and quickly carried to a hospital in Greensboro, where his condition is reported as but hopeless.

The unfortunate young man is a son of the late Walter Stevens, who has been dead a few years, who removed some years ago with his family from Peter's Creek township, near Danbury, to Montgomery county, where Mrs. Stevens, the widow, now resides. Carr is a nephew of P. M. Stevens, of Danbury. He has recently been living on the farm of Clay Tucker, in Guilford county, near Colfax.

Seven Island Road

The county or state highway forces are at work on the Seven Island road, using a number of hands, a tractor and road machine.

This road, which leads from Danbury to Seven Island ford on Dan river, will emerge in Peter's Creek township at a point near Finner Priddy's garage. Leading from the river north, it will traverse the Shelton ridge.

This road it is said will decrease the distance to the county seat from Sandy Ridge and northern parts of the county, some three or four miles.

TO LOCATE AT COUNTY HOME

EROSION CAMP OF TWO HUNDRED MEN, ALL WHITE, TO BE CONSTRUCTED IMMEDIATELY -- COUNTY PROPERTY TO BE IMPROVED FIRST.

The latest news is that President Roosevelt's "erosion camp" allocated to Stokes, will be located on the county home farm, and that the campers are to be all white, and not colored, as had been at first indicated.

Everybody wonders what "erosion camp" means, and we are told that it means "land saving."

Erosion is defined to be a wearin' away.

We are to be shown practical methods of preserving the soil, and among the ways are terracing, ditching, draining, etc. The county home farm land is the first example.

This erosion camp is to accommodate 200 men who will receive compensation of \$1.00 per day each, with railroad fare, clothing, hospital bills provided for. The workers enlist for a period of six months.

It is part of the government's gigantic plan of relieving unemployment. All the camps throughout the country are supposed to give work to 250,000 men.

State To Share Again In Federal Aid For Roads

Raleigh, June 15.—Federal aid funds for road building in North Carolina make possible an early start on the construction of 14 North Carolina highway projects on which low bids aggregate slightly over \$500,000.

The release of these funds in the state was possible by the lifting of President Roosevelt's ban on expenditure of emergency federal aid funds.

E. B. Jeffress, chairman of the highway and public works department, was informed today by telephone by the federal bureau of roads that government funds will be available at once for the deferred projects on which bids were received on March 23.

Chairman Jeffress stated that he would send instructions to the successful bidders immediately for starting their projects.
