

ELECTION TO BE ON NOVEMBER 7

PEOPLE WILL BE CALLED UPON TO VOTE ON THE QUESTION OF REPEALING THE EIGHTEENTH AMENDMENT — NO NEW REGISTRATION.

To the Citizens of North Carolina:

On November the 7th, 1933, the people of North Carolina are called upon to vote on the question of repealing the 18th Amendment to the Constitution of the United States. The General Assembly of North Carolina submitted this question to the people of our State in the form of "Convention or no Convention" to which delegates are to be elected upon the basis of representation of each county in the lower House of the General Assembly. These delegates to be voted for at the same time the question of Convention or no Convention is voted on.

Thus there are two ballots to be voted in each of the counties, and each delegate so elected must cast his vote in the convention in accordance with the vote by which he or she was elected. There will be one hundred and twenty (120) delegates in the convention, each county being represented as it is reported in the House of Representatives; some counties such as Mecklenburg, Forsyth, Guilford and Wake will have three (3) delegates each. A number of counties will have two (2) delegates and each county will have at least one (1) delegate. These delegates will be elected on a ticket "For Repeal" or "Against Repeal," in other words if a county votes against repeal its delegate or delegates in the convention will vote to sustain the 18th Amendment and keep it a part of the Constitution. If a county votes for repeal its delegates will vote to take the 18th Amendment out of the Federal Constitution.

Any elector holding an official position either State or Federal, can offer for delegate, holding office is no bar to being a delegate in the convention; any person desiring to be a candidate for delegate shall file notice thirty (30) days before the election with the County Board of Elections, declaring he or she is "For the repeal of the 18th Amendment," or "Against the Repeal of the 18th Amendment," supported by a written petition signed by qualified voters of the county equal in number to two per cent (2 per cent) of the total vote cast for Governor in said county in the gubernatorial election of 1932.

Those offering for delegates either "For Repeal" or "Against Repeal" shall be selected by the County Board of Elections, when there are more offering for delegate than the county is entitled to in the convention the person having the largest number of signers on the petition in counties having one (1) delegate and the persons who have the greatest number of signers in counties entitled to more than one (1) delegate shall be the delegate or delegates in either case, to be voted for in said election.

There will be but one (1) registration day, that to be on the 27th day of October, on which day persons who have moved from one precinct to another are entitled to register. No absentee ballots will be permitted. The County Board of Elections shall choose and select one (1) Judge of Election known to favor "Repeal of the 18th Amendment" and one (1) Judge who is not in favor of the Repeal of the

18th Amendment.

No markers or assistants are allowed in said election. Any voter physically unable to enter a booth or to mark a ballot may be assisted in entering such booth and in marking the ballot by the election official upon whom the voters calls for assistance. The election shall be held under the general election laws of North Carolina, except in the provisions enumerated above. The election will be secret as is provided under the laws of North Carolina.

The State Board of Elections will supply the ballots for "Convention and no Convention" and each County Board of Elections will supply the ballots for delegates to the voters of their several counties. If a majority of votes cast in said election shall be "No Convention" then there shall be no convention, if the votes are to the contrary then the convention shall meet.

The pay of the delegates shall be the sum of ten dollars (\$10.00) each and the expense to and from Raleigh. The convention should not sit more than one day (1) and cannot perform any act except to vote upon the "Repeal of the 18th Amendment."

There will be no new registration; those electors who are entitled to register by reason of coming of age can register.

Checks Now Coming For Cotton Reduction

While a small number of "cotton checks" have been received by county farm agents from the Agricultural Adjustment Administration, it is expected that these will begin to arrive in volume during the week of September 4.

Dean I. O. Schaub, director of the cotton reduction campaign in North Carolina, has been advised by a number of agents that a few checks have been received. H. M. Slaughter, farm agent of Chatham county received about ten early last week and other agents are getting small numbers.

"During the week of September 4, the checks will move in large numbers," Mr. Schaub said. "We have been advised that the robot machine used for handling these will turn them out at the rate of 40,000 to 50,000 a day. Even at this rate it will take until September 22 to write and mail the checks to all Southern farmers who have cooperated in the reduction plan. Then there are a number of growers with whom adjustments will have to be made so that these particular checks will be delayed."

Mr. Schaub said he had been advised by C. A. Cobb, chief of the cotton section of the AAA, that attached to each check covering cash payment in the case of the combined cash and option contract, there will be an option contract calling for the number of bales optioned by the farmer to whom the check is issued.

These optioned contracts must be detached from the check and held for delivery later. Mr. Cobb will wire the farm agents when delivery may be made. This is necessary, he said, to give equal opportunity to farmers and to facilitate orderly handling of option contracts in Washington.
