ON THE ROAD TO HANGING ROCK

IDENTIFYING FAMILIAR PLACES ON THE TRAIL — CHESTNUT COVE, LICK HOLLOW AND GRASSY GAP ARE THE NAMES OF THE DEPRESSIONS BETWEEN THE THREE PEAKS.

Mr. L. J. Young, who is one of the oldest citizens of the county and who is probably better acquainted with the mountain than any other person of this section, gives the Reporter some information relative to the identity of certain points of interest on the road now being constructed to Hanging Rock.

From Danbury westward, there are three prominent peaks on the ridge, which have been called by some persons the "Three Sisters." Beyond the first peak, the gap or depression is well known as Chestnut Cove, and named by others as Orchard Gap.

Beyond the second peak, the gap is known as Lick Hollow, this being the place where deer often come to lick salt or eat moss from the many rocks in that vicinity.

Behind the third or last peak, is a flat meadow-like area which has always been designated as "Grassy Gap."

It is reported here that through misunderstanding signs have been erected in the gap beyond the second peak indicating that place to be "Grassy Gap," which is an error. Grassy Gap is beyond the third peak.

After passing Grassy Gap, or the third peak, the route takes a slight incline on to the cliffs at the end of the ridge, and the precipice is known as Hanging Rock.

NEXT TUESDAY IS THE ELECTION

NORTH CAROLINA, PENNSYLVANIA, OHIO, UTAH AND SOUTH CAROLINA TO VOTE ON QUESTION OF REPEAL OF EIGHTEENTH AMENDMENT — RESULT IN DOUBT IN STATE AND COUNTY.

The question of the repeal of the 18th amendment will be voted on next Tuesday in five States, to-wit, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Utah and South Carolina.

Four of the above States will almost certainly go wet, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Utah, and probably South Carolina will vote for repeal.

The result in North Carolina is in doubt, with both sides claiming the victory.

Only three more wet States are necessary to nullify the amendment, 33 having voted in favor of repeal.

In Stokes county the result is as doubtful as the State. The balloting may go either way, wet or dry, and nobody will be greatly surprised.

N. O. Petree is the candidate of the dries in Stokes, while Joseph W. Neal represents the wets.

AIRPLANE HITS GROUND AT MEADOWS

NOBODY SERIOUSLY HURT, BUT MACHINE IS DAMAGED ABOUT \$200.00 — ENROUTE FROM BLUEFIELD TO WINSTON-LEM.

An airplane that passed over Danbury late Sunday afternoon, flying very low, was wrecked in a forced landing at Meadows four miles south of here.

The machine which was piloted by Roger Lalleen of Keystone, West Va., accompanied by Duane Coon and Manuel Giam, of Northfork, West Va., was damaged to the extent of about \$200.00. None of the occupants was seriously injured, though one sustained a fractured rib or two, and the others slight bruises.

The plane was owned by Harvey Amos, of Bluefield, West Va. On being apprised of the accident, Mr. Amos arrived early Monday from Bluefield in his automobile, making the run here in 2 hours and 35 minutes, the distance being 125 miles.

It was stated that something went wrong with the machine, making a forced landing advisable. The landing was made in the field a short distance from the home of J. Will Morefield at Meadows.

The disabled plane was loaded on a truck and carried back to Bluefield Monday.
