## STOKES SWEPT BY DRY VOTE

EVERY PRECINCT IN THE COUNTY GIVES MAJORITY AGAINST REPEAL, EXCEPT FREEMAN — BROWN MOUNTAIN 100 PER CENT. DRY — THE MAJORITY IN COUNTY OVER 1,000 — REPEAL WINS IN NATION.

Although the repeal of the 18th Amendment is now certain, by reason of the vote in Pennsylvania, Ohio, Kentucky and Utah, the Pro-

hibitionists carried North Carolina and Stokes County by overwhelming majorities at Tuesday's election. In North Carolina the majority against repeal is around 150,000. South Carolina also voted dry by a small majority. In this county every precinct went against the amendment except Freeman, while Brown Mountain recorded a 100 per cent dry vote. This precinct is a candidate for the championship in North Carolina dry honors. The official vote in the county was as follows:

S. J. Kirby Appointed Farm Demonstrator — Land Ordered Advertised for 1932 Taxes.

The board of County Commissioners were in regular session at the court house Monday. Aside from the regular routine of business coming before the board at each meeting S. J. Kirby was appointed Farm Demonstrator for Stokes county. Mr. Kirby has been working in the county for some time for the government in wheat production control movement and is already known to the people in the county. He has had considerable experience in other counties where he has served in the same capacity. It is necessary that Stokes have a County Agent in order to share in the crop production control benefits, both tobacco and wheat.

The federal government and the state help pay the expense of an agent for the county and Mr. Kirby was highly recommended to the board for the position.

The commissioners ordered land sold for 1932 taxes and it is being advertised this week.

Enrollment running close to 400, with 85 high school pupils. The school spirit is splendid both among pupils and teachers. The 2 new teachers in the high school are Mr. D. P. Stinson, who has charge of the science department, and Miss Lucile Steers, who has charge of the English and history work.

While the members of the Basketball team are to be congratulated for the pride they may have in their school, and are ready to "challenge" other schools in the county for games, still they realize that they have a good many improvements to make yet before they reach the desired excellence generally designated by the word "Champion".

The grammar grades are well taken care of by Mr. Clyde Forrest in the seventh, Mr. Hundley, sixth; Mrs. Christian, fourth; Mrs. Kallam, Miss Jefferson, third; Miss Southern, second and Mrs. J. E. Coon, first.

That part of the school retained at Asbury has Mr. Partridge and Mrs. Cook in charge of the work. With the excellent list of teachers and keen interest on the part of the patrons throughout the community, the prospect is indeed good for a successful year's work.

The Halloween social gathering netted the school \$35.00 which goes toward the equipment of the laboratory in the science department.

## Stokes Officers Get Man and Liquor

Lively Chase Sunday Night Near Sandy Ridge at Dodge-town — Ray, Wall and Smith also Get Two Cars.

Deputy Sheriffs Carl Ray, Mack Wall and Berk Smith captured two cars and one man in a chase Sunday night including about 100 gallons of liquor. Bob McKenzie, of High Point was the man taken into custody and he is now in a Winston-Salem hospital quite ill said to be from the lack of dope. Two other men in the car made their escape when the car was overtaken by officers.

The deputies chased the two cars over the sand clay roads, which were in a slippery condition due to recent rains, until one car slipped into the ditch. The other surrendered after a brisk chase. Both cars were of the Ford V-8 type.

Officers had long suspected these cars which had been seen in this section for the past several months and had chased them heretofore but the topsoil roads had been dry and the fleeing cars raised so much dust that they were able to elude the officers. However, the rains for the past few days proved the undoing of the rum runners when they were unable to match the skillful driving of Burk Smith over the slippery roads.
