PERSONNEL STOKES FARM LOANS RELIEF OFFICE SOON AVAILABLE

LIST OF OFFICE AND FIELD WORKERS — PROJECTS IN HAND — ORGANIZATION NOW HAS HEADQUARTERS AT DANBURY, WITH MRS. DOYLE IN CHARGE.

At the request of the Reporter, Mrs. Minnie Doyle, who is Director of Stokes Relief with headquarters now at Danbury, in the N. A. Martin building, furnishes a list of the personnel of the organization, together with an outline of projects in hand.

As was stated in the last issue of the Reporter, the federal relief office, formerly stationed at Germantown under the supervision of County Superintendent of Schools J. C. Carson, has been moved here, with Mrs. Doyle in charge.

The office and field forces of the organization are as follows:

Mrs. Doyle is requisitioning today for the following projects:

To repair road from Pinnacle to Volunteer, which will require one foreman, one time keeper and 18 laborers.

To repair road from Asbury to intersect with Route 89, two miles west of Francisco and from Asbury to intersect Route 89, one mile of Westfield, which will require one foreman, one timekeeper and 18 laborers.

Painting of public school building at Danbury will use two unskilled painters and one skilled painter.

To construct 1000 sanitary privies under the supervision of the State Board of Health. Robert Sisk will have charge of this work, and is now in Winston-Salem taking his training under Dr. Hege. Three sanitation men will be drawn out Tuesday night to assist Mr. Sisk. After the work is outlined some day workers will be drawn to help them.

J. S. Kuykendall, of Winston-Salem, was here Tuesday. We have known Mr. Kuykendall for a long time. He is one of the best citizens of the Twin city, friendly, accommodating and trustworthy. He is all silk, and a yard wide.

FOR THE PRODUCTION OF CROPS, LIVE STOCK AND POULTRY RAISING — LOCAL ASSOCIATIONS UNDER CONTROL OF FARMERS.

Loans for the production of general agricultural crops, livestock or poultry breeding or raising will be available to Stokes county and other North Carolina farmers within the next few weeks according to President Ernest Graham of the Production Credit Corporation of Columbia.

"Due to the hearty cooperation of Extension forces, County Agents and County officials" said President Graham, "we are making rapid strides in the organization of local production credit associations. Our present plan calls for approximately 30 such associations to supply the credit needs of North Carolina farmers for production purposes."

Production credit associations will take the place of the Regional Agricultural Credit Corporations and as they will handle loans for production purposes, no feed or seed loans will be available in 1934.

Local associations will be owned, controlled and managed by bona fide farmers all of whom must be borrowers in order to be eligible for membership. Associations will be directed by a board of 5, 7 or 9 members chosen by the borrowers. Executive officers, field representatives and a secretary-treasurer will be elected by the board. The secretary-treasurer will be elected by the board. He is the only person connected with the organization who does not have to be a borrower.

The local association will pass on members' notes and endorse them for discount with the intermediate Credit Bank of Columbia. At present borrowers from local associations will obtain their loans at an interest rate of 6 per cent. Loans will be made for three to twelve months in most instances; however, livestock loans may run the maximum of three years.

The Production Credit Corporation of Columbia will act in a Supervisory capacity to insure the most efficient operation of local units.

Epidemic of Measles at Germantown

While measles has not interrupted the fine progress of the superb Germantown high school, yet the disease has appeared in epidemic form. This news was given Monday by Prof. J. C. Carson, Superintendent of schools, who said that otherwise generally the health of the school folk in the county was good.

Prof. Carson leaves Wednesday for Raleigh to confer with State authorities regarding school programs ahead.

TO URGE SURVEY COUNTY MINERALS

DR. J. L. HANES INTERESTED IN DEVELOPMENT OF STOKES RESOURCES UNDER CWA — FINE DEPOSITS OF IRON, MICA, COAL, MANGANESE AND OTHER VALUABLE MINERALS MAY BE DEVELOPED.

Dr. J. L. Hanes, of Pine Hall, is interested in securing assistance under the CWA programs to develop the mineral resources of the county.

It is a well known fact that many fine deposits of iron, mica, coal, manganese, feldspar, hematite, talc, and other minerals exist in Stokes county. Iron was manufactured in catalan forges before and during the civil war on a considerable scale, the product being of a superior quality.

Mica of a superb class was developed commercially for a number of years as late as 1922. The Hawkins mica mines near Snow Creek are proverbial for their excellence.

Coal exists in important quantity and quality on Town Fork creek, or nearby, and is at present in the process of being mined on a commercial scale.

Many other minerals of AI quality are present at numbers of places in the county.

Dr. Hanes expects to visit Raleigh this week and enlist the interest of the CWA in the practicability of making a mineral survey of the county, in the program of relief to the unemployed.

An effort will be made to secure the services of an expert geologist to make the survey preliminary to the practical development of the minerals. It is urged that many persons could thus be given employment.
