KING MAN BECOMES CHAIRMAN — REPUBLICANS MAN EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE AGAINST COUNTY PRIMER.

(Reported for the Reporter.)

Pursuant to a call by its Chairman of the Republican Executive Committee for Stokes County, a Republican Convention was held at Danbury, North Carolina, March 31st, 1934, 1:30 P. M.

M. T. Chilton acting chairman and N. E. Wall, secretary, the following business was transacted by the convention:

Upon motion of M. O. Jones and seconded by A. S. Voss, the following resolution was adopted by the convention. Have the open discrimination against the

chairman, executive committee and six members of each township, at a call meeting to be held at Danbury, North Carolina, April 14th, 1934, at 1 o'clock P. M. for the purpose of selecting a suitable ticket for all county and township races for the coming fall election and not enter into a countywide primary.

Upon motion of A. S. Voss and seconded by C. M. Jones resolutions prepared by committee on resolutions, were unanimously adopted as follows:

All business coming before the convention having been acted upon, it was moved and seconded that the convention adjourn.

NORTH CAROLINA. STOKES COUNTY.

Pursuant to call of the Chairman of the Republican Executive Committee for Stokes county, the Republicans met in convention at Danbury, N. C., on March 31, 1934. The following resolution was read and adopted:

First: We are mindful of the peculiar financial condition now existing in our country and especially in Stokes county, and in order to protect the best interest of all concerned, and especially the tax payer, it is of the greatest importance that we exercise good judgment and conduct the business of our county on a basis that will make it possible to pay the outstanding indebtedness of the county and at the same time the property right and homes of the individual tax payers. With the exercise of the proper judgment we think this entirely possible.

Second: We are thoroughly convinced that the county is burdened with unnecessary expenses. In some cases salaries are too high. In other cases we have employees on the pay roll that might be dispensed with in a very peculiar time like this, therefore, we recommend that salary reductions be made, commensurate with the income of the tax payers who have to pay it and further, we recommend that such positions as are now being filled at the expense of Stokes county even partially by Stokes county, be discontinued to the end that the tax payers of the county may be saved from tax destitution.

Third: That we oppose the further indebtedness by the county commissioners or any other board of Stokes county until the financial conditions have been greatly improved and the property owners of our county can feel that their homes and property have been made safe from any county indebtedness.

Fourth: We oppose the present retail sales tax of North Carolina and pledge ourselves to an honest effort for its repeal.

Fifth: We feel that there is a great discrimination on the part of our car owners, the parties who own and operate cars, for family use only travel but a few miles annually on the public roads, therefore, we recommend that a uniform tax for cars be reduced in proportion to the size of the cars, ranging from three to five dollars per car.

Sixth: We condemn the present election law of North Carolina. In its operation there is an open discrimination against the

minority parties, therefore, we pledge ourselves to the support of an election law that will give each and every political party recognized in North Carolina an equal representation on the boards of election to the end that all votes cast for each and candidate of any party will be counted and declared as cast.

Failure to list or attempt to evade just taxation will subject the taxpayer to a specific penalty of 25 per cent. of total tax and all persons who are liable for a poll tax, and fail to give themselves in, and all who own property and fail to list it, will be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction, fined or imprisoned.
