LIST YOUR PROPERTY FOR TAXES

Tax listing for the county of Stokes will start Monday, April 9, 1934, and continue to May 7, 1934. All taxpayers should list their property early and evade the penalty. Failure to list or attempt to evade just taxation will subject the taxpayer to a specific penalty of 25 per cent. of total tax and, all persons who are liable for a poll tax, and fail to give themselves in, and all who own property and fail to list it, will be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction, fined or imprisoned. 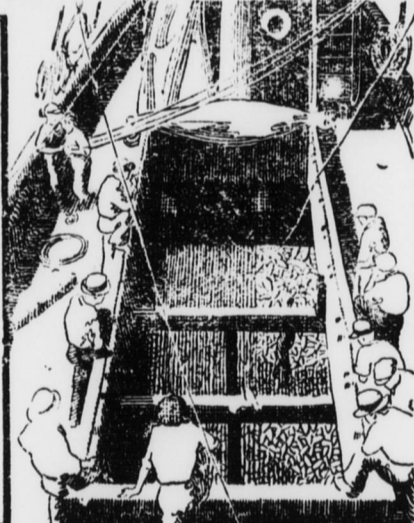
