It will be necessary for the grower to come to the office to sign a receipt for his marketing cards as he did when he received his rental check. Growers will be notified when to come to the office to sign for these cards.

No duplicate marketing cards will be issued. If either the land owner or tenant to whom a card is issued loses or misplaces his card it will be too bad, because the rules govering this work do not permit the issuing of duplicate cards.
