PLEA CHANGED TO MANSLAUGHTER, RESULTING IN PRISON SENTENCE—OTHER CASES DISPOSED OF BY JUDGE ALLEY AND SOLICITOR KOONTZ — COURT ADJOURNS NOON THURSDAY.

Quick justice came to Lindsey Hughes who shot Minnie Gray to death in Walnut Cove last Sunday and was tried in Superior court here today.

The affair occurred at "London," Walnut Cove's colored district. Minnie Gray was the wife of Walter Gray. It was a drunken brawl in which jealously probably figured. The arrest was made at once by Stokes officers, and Lindsey was brought to jail on the charge of murder, but a compromise of manslaughter was agreed to by the State so Lindsey goes

BIG PARTY RALLY AT CLUB HOUSE

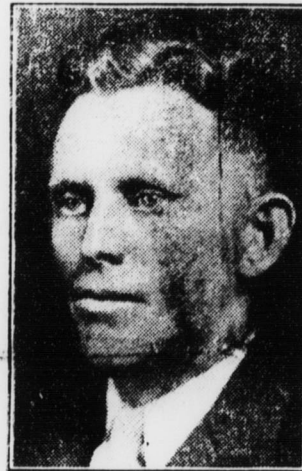
