The figures of the 1935 census of agriculture indicates arm tenancy is still increasing in all major sections of the country. Tenancy in the states of this region is as follows.

North Carolina, 142,158 tenents, gain of 3 per cent. since 1930; Virginia, 58,386 tenants. an of 16 per cent. since 1930: Kentucky, 103,215 tenants, gain of 16 per cent. since 1930: Tencissee, 126,607 tenants, gain of 11 per cent. since 1930; West Virginia, 27,021 tenants, gain of 76 per cent, since 1930.

According to information obtained from the office of the State Agricultural Statistidian, Mr. Palmer reports that Stokes county had in the year 1935 2,037 tenant farmers against 1,931 for the year 1930, or an increase of tenant farmers by approximately 5 per cent.
