## EX-CONFEDERATES RECEIVE PENSIONS

**NOW ONLY TWO SOLDIERS LEFT IN COUNTY, WHILE SEVENTEEN WIDOWS SURVIVE — SOLDIERS GET \$182.50 EACH.**

The semi-annual distribution of checks to ex-Confederate soldiers and widows of soldiers is now being completed by Clerk of the Court J. Watt Tuttle. Only two veterans survive in the county.

Class A soldiers receive \$182.50 twice a year, while Class A widows get \$150.00 semi-annually. Class B widows are given \$50 semi-annually.

## R. O. PALMER GIVES FIGURES

**TREND FROM INDIVIDUAL OWNERSHIP TO FARM TENANCY DESCRIBED AS MAJOR PROBLEM — STOKES GAIN, FIVE PER CENT.**

The trend from individual ownership to farm tenancy was described as one of the major problems of the United States by R. O. Palmer, of Danbury, N. C., Rehabilitation supervisor of the Resettlement Administration for Stokes county. Mr. Palmer quoted figures compiled by the Resettlement Administration showing that nearly half of all farmers in the United States are now tenants.

"Every agricultural section of the country," he said, "has some tenancy." It ranges from around eight per cent. in the New England states to better than forty-five per cent. in parts of the corn belt and a high of more than seventy five per cent. of all farmers in some parts of the cotton belt.

The figures of the 1935 census of agriculture indicates that farm tenancy is still increasing in all major sections of the country. Tenancy in the states of this region is as follows.

North Carolina, 142,158 tenants, gain of 3 per cent. since 1930; Virginia, 58,386 tenants, gain of 16 per cent. since 1930; Kentucky, 163,215 tenants, gain of 16 per cent. since 1930; Tennessee, 129,607 tenants, gain of 11 per cent. since 1930; West Virginia, 27,021 tenants, gain of 76 per cent. since 1930.

According to information obtained from the office of the State Agricultural Statistician, Mr. Palmer reports that Stokes county had in the year 1935 2,037 tenant farmers against 1,931 for the year 1930, or an increase of tenant farmers by approximately 5 per cent.
