LAWSONS BOUND OVER TO COURT

TRIAL OF LAWSONVILLE CITIZENS WEDNESDAY ATTRACTS LARGE CROWD — FRACAS GREW OUT OF SHOOTING OF A DOG.

Jim Tom Lawson was bound over to court here Wednesday in a bond of \$100 charged with cruelty to animals. Woodrow Lawson, his son, was bound over in a bond of \$100 charged with assault on Calvin Mabe with a deadly weapon.

In a verbal scrap on the highway between Jim Tom and Calvin, in which cursing and abuse was charged, both participants were taxed with the cost. Mabe paid his part. Lawson appealed to court.

The affair which occurred at Mabe's garage at Lawsonville, appeared to have grown out of the shooting of Mabe's dog by Jim Tom. A large crowd assembled to hear the trial Wednesday before Justice N. E. Wall, quite a number of witnesses being examined on either side. The evidence showed that Jim Tom and Calvin were engaged in a dispute when young Woodrow, who is a son of Jim Tom, came up and took up the quarrel, which resulted in Mabe being struck in the face and eye with what he contends was a knife or other deadly weapon in the fist of Woodrow. A wound was made which a Stuart, Va., physician sewed up. Lawson claims he only used his fist.

A few nights previously Lawson shot Mabe's bird dog in his (Lawson's) yard. In passing the garage he buttingly inquired of Mabe how "old Bill" (the dog) was getting along.

This started the row. The garage and Lawson's home are right near each other.

On account of the prominence of the parties, considerable interest in the affair was taken by the neighbors and the public.
