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CELEBRATION OF AUGUST 6-7

COMING OF LIGHT AND POWER TO BE OCCASION OF WELCOMING CEREMONIES AND DEMONSTRATIONS OF ELECTRICAL EQUIPMENT—LADIES FINE ARTS CLUB TO CO-OPERATE — DISPLAYS IN THE ANTE-ROOMS OF M. E. CHURCH—EVERYBODY INVITED.

Up in Danbury we have wonderfully pure water, bracing fresh air and it is ten degrees cooler up. "Where the Mountains Begin;" we have good roads and now, long years of hope are fulfilled with the advent of Duke Power service, which is to be turned on about August 3rd and this action will mark the beginning of a two day celebration in the form of a most complete display and demonstration of all manner and forms of electrical equipment and devices now available to our people for adding to their comfort and economy.

The extension of the Duke Power service to Danbury is an outcome of the acquirement by them of the Walnut Cove power plant which was sponsored by the Reporter a few years ago, and which has immensely benefited that community. Now, service will be available to all real deals between these points and perhaps, one many months, to other communities.

The Danbury celebration planned to welcome the coming of Duke service as one of the greatest improvements and benefits available in modern life and business. It affords every family the opportunity of more comfort and better living conditions, and for all business the means of improved methods and more economy.

The celebration will take the form of exhibition and demonstration of the appliances and equipment now available to homes and business houses for the application of electric current to their needs. Miss Addie Malone, a nationally known Home Economist, will present for one afternoon and evening a cooking school and the Duke Power Company will have a complete exhibit under the direction of Mr. W. R. Weir, District Manager, and his assistants. Other dealers will be present in person with complete exhibits. The Ladies Fine Arts Club of Danbury has been invited to co-operate with Miss Malone in her Home Economics demonstrations and the ladies of the Methodist and Presbyterian

Churches will serve refreshments. The exhibits and meetings will be held in the ante-rooms of the Methodist church and everyone, especially the ladies are invited to attend from 12 noon to 11 p. m., Thursday and Friday, August 6th and 7th. Complete details will be given in the Reporter next week.

HAS KING LOST ITS ROAD FIGHT?

NEW HARDSURFACE ROUTED PARALLEL WITH PRESENT THROUGHFARE THROUGH TOWN — WAYNICK AND OTHER MEMBERS OF HIGHWAY COMMISSION CONFER WITH CITIZENS, BUT REFUSE TO CHANGE PLANS — ROYAL RECEPTION BY MEN AND WOMEN OF KING TO VISITORS.

Capus Waynick and other members of the State highway commission met citizens of King, Winston-Salem, Walnut Cove, Danbury and other sections of Stokes in a conference Monday over the proposed location of the new hardsurface highway through the town of King.

After deliberating, the commission refused to change its location of the road, which will be parallel to the present throughfare through the town of King, and a hundred or two yards distant.

The meeting was held in the school building at King. Present were a large number of King business people, as well as citizens from Walnut Cove, Germantown, Danbury and other sections of the county, who joined with the King citizens in protest at the commission's location of the road.

Chairman Waynick explained that the commission was building the road with an eye not only to the best interests of the State, but to the town itself, which would not, he said, be damaged so much as it thought. He said by choosing the present location, the State had the benefit of \$180,000 of federal funds which would be received on account of the elimination of two grade crossings. He said the new road would cost in the neighborhood of \$500,000. A new street would be furnished the town of King, while the present thoroughfare through the town would be repaired and kept in first class shape. He declined the offer of a compromise to build the present road of cement, which he said would cost \$20,000.

Prior to the meeting, the visitors were invited to lunch prepared by the ladies of King in their new club building. Here dinner was spread and enjoyed by probably 100 people. The visitors were lavish in their praises of the charming hospitality and the elegant repast furnished by the ladies.

Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever In Stokes

Mrs. Thurman Joyce, of Meadows, is ill with Rocky Mountain Spotted fever, according to advices received from Dr. Helsabeck, of Walnut Cove. This disease is caused by the bite of a common cattle or dog tick, and is a dangerous malady, though it is not contagious. The patient is affected as if with typhoid fever, and the disease lasts about 4 weeks.
