A. D. FOLGER AND HANCOCK CROSS

ACTION OF CONGRESSMAN IN MT. AIRY POSTOFFICE MUDDE, NOT UNDERSTOOD — MT. AIRY TIMES REPORT OF THE INCIDENT.

That there is some misunderstanding at Mt. Airy over Hancock's postoffice appointment, appears from the following report of the incident in the last issue of the Mt. Airy Times:

The appointment of Attorney Henry Folger as acting postmaster came as a complete surprise to the citizens of Mount Airy Saturday when it became known on the streets. There had prevailed in the public mind the thought that Congressman Frank Hancock would recommend the post office department at Washington one of the two remaining eligible candidates for the post.

In a long distance telephone interview with Congressman Hancock, who was at his home in Oxford, Sunday, the fifth district representative stated that in appointing Mr. Folger "I wished to get some loyal Democrat in the office until something definite could be done in the near future. The appointment was made with the concurrence of the Surry county chairman (A. Folger for the cause of the executive committee and with the approval of a number of leading citizens. It was made in recognition of, and with gratitude for the work of John H. H. Folger for the cause of the Democratic party for more than 30 years."

Congressman Hancock further stated that this occasion offered him his "first opportunity to do something for the Folgers who have done so much for the party." He stated that this appointment had been urged to him by former Senator John Folger, and he (Hancock) heartily concurred in it, assuming full personal responsibility for the act.

The statement of Mr. Hancock that the appointment was made with the "concurrence of the Surry county chairman" came into direct conflict with a statement made by Chairman A. D. Folger of the executive committee Saturday afternoon. Mr. Folger declared that he was "completely astounded by the appointment and knew nothing whatsoever about the matter until he heard it on the streets here in Mount Airy."

Mr. Folger made a statement for publication in last Friday's issue of the TIMES that he would recommend a candidate for the appointment only after consultation with the Mount Airy executive committee and then later with the full county Democratic executive committee. The Dobson attorney emphatically declared that he or his committee had not been consulted about the appointment and that he knew nothing about it until the appointment was made.
