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## G-MEN MAY BE SUMMONED

**WARNING FROM LIEUT. LAURO OF THE CCC CAMP— PERSONS MUST BE CAREFUL ABOUT RECEIVING STOLEN PROPERTY.**

"A tip to the wise at times is sufficient, and it is well wise at this time to warn the citizens of this and surrounding communities of the danger attached to buying Government articles or property that may be offered for sale by individuals other than Governmental agencies who, after certain proceedings are authorized by the law to dispose of property that has been condemned."

This warning is given out by Lieut. Joseph V. Lauro, commanding company 3422, CCC, Danbury, N. C.

Lieut. Lauro further states: "The person that buys governmental property otherwise than the authorized agencies may be securing stolen property and thus lays himself liable to the offense of buying, receiving and concealing stolen property and can be prosecuted under state or federal laws."

"The local law enforcement agencies of this community are composed of honest, competent men under capable supervision of Sheriff J. John Taylor, are at all times endeavoring to safeguard the citizens but without the cooperation of the citizens the efforts of the law officers are in vain. When this occurs, your community is over run with petty thievery and you have started something that is hard to eradicate."

"The person who tries to acquire governmental property by soliciting a CCC enrollee to sell, whether shoes, clothing or otherwise, is not only aiding and abetting the commission of a crime, but he creates a demand for an article and gives the seller the opportunity to start stealing to meet the demand. Thus the innocent citizen has started a boy off to a career of crime that may lead to—who knows where?"

"To individuals who fail to cooperate with the authorities of the CCC Camp in maintaining a high standard of morale in and around the community, who do not refrain from soliciting the sales of government property, be warned, that aid will be secured from the Federal Bureau of Investigation and State Government to eradicate this evil influence."

"Traffic with a CCC enrollee does the community no good; the citizen should buy his wearing apparel from a local merchant who carries on a fair and legitimate business. It will circulate money faster, aid business and make a better community."

"The cooperation of the entire citizenry of the community is requested in creating a spirit in the enrollee of becoming a useful, honest, upright citizen, instead of a sneak thief. All information of contrary conditions should

## GORDON HACKETT VISITS DANBURY

**DISTRICT HIGHWAY COMMISSIONER MEETS ROAI DELEGATION HERE — MR. HACKETT'S FIRST TRIP TO COUNTY — LEAVES OUR PEOPLE PLEASSED, BUT FULL OF DOUBTS — TEL PROPOSED GERMANTON WALNUT COVE ROAD.**

Coming to Danbury to meet a delegation asking for the improvement of the highway from Germanton to Walnut Cove, District Highway Commissioner Gordon Hackett of Wilkesboro paid his first visit to Danbury this week.

Our Stokes citizens were much pleased to have the commissioner visit us, but he was able to give them scant encouragement as to roads in the near future. He stated that the county had already received far more than its just allocation in the building of the wide concrete turn-pike via Pinnacle and King which Elmer Newsum has very appropriately named the Lakes-to-Florida highway. This road which skirts the southern edge of the county, is charged up to Stokes road programs in the amount of \$450,000. This of course includes several expensive bridges.

A large delegation met Mr. Hackett here and asked for the rebuilding and hardsurfacing of the road which leads from Meadows township, a mile north of Germanton, via the Lawson place and other points down close to the A. & Y. railroad to Walnut Cove, entering the latter place and intersecting with No. 89 at Fulton's store in Walnut Cove. Mr. Hackett was unable to make any definite promises with reference to this road except that he would put it on the map for the earliest consideration possible, and would send engineers to re-locate it. The proposed highway serves a large number of citizens between Germanton and Walnut Cove, and is a very important road. During bad weather, lying on bottom or lowlands largely, it becomes almost impassable, and at the present time is in a wretched condition in many places.

He is a past Commander of the Legion Post number 89 of North Carolina and at present is the Commander of the state. Senator Horton has already rendered his resignation as the 11th Legion District of this District Commander to the State Commander, so that he may enter the race for solicitor.

Mr. Horton studied law at Wake Forest College and has been actively engaged in the practice of law in Caswell county for the past fourteen years. He has served as president of the Caswell county Bar Association for the past two years.

Senator Horton has been an active Democrat all his life. He served as State Senator from 1927 to 1929. He is a Rotarian, a Mason and a member of the Methodist Church.

Senator Horton, said, "It is my purpose, if elected, to see that the duties of this office of Solicitor are carried out in the light of a protector of the citizens of the district from the criminal element and not as a public prosecutor interested merely in securing convictions of the unfortunate. I will be entirely independent of any alliances and will not be a mouth piece of any group seeking political advantage. I plan to wage an active campaign but a campaign in keeping with the dignity of the office for which I am a candidate."

## Prenatal and Well Baby Clinic

The monthly prenatal and Well Baby Clinic will be held at Reynolds high school on Thursday, February 3rd, at 3 p. m. Dr. Reeves of Walnut Cove, will have charge of the clinic, assisted by the local nurse. Dr. Reeves will examine the children for physical defects and inoculate for diphtheria infants over six months of age.

Expectant mothers, both white and colored, that have not visited their own private physician and had a thorough physical examination are invited to attend the clinic. The people in charge of the clinic are endeavoring to reach the group of mothers that never consult a doctor during the prenatal period and to teach them the importance of prenatal care. They are also anxious that all babies and pre-school children that have not been protected against diphtheria, receive this protection by going to their own physician or by bringing their children to this clinic.

Dr. J. Roy Hege, director of Forayth-Stokes-Yadkin Health Department, and Miss Bessie Dalton, Supervising Nurse, were visitors to Danbury on January 26th.
