Returning from the army, Mr. Gwyn resumed his studies and graduated from Trinity College Law School in 1921. He located at Reidsville, where he has since lived.

Although Mr. Gwyn is a comparatively young man, he ranks among the leading lawyers of the State. He has appeared in much important litigation. He is known as a vigorous and successful advocate, always true to his clients and fair to his adversaries.

Mr. Gwyn has been a hard worker in the Democratic Party. He served two long and difficult terms in the State Senate 1931 and 1933. There he proved beyond question that he was a servant of the whole people; that he welfare of the average man was the end to be sought; that he could not be unduly influenced by corporate powers, that he the courage to fight for what he thought was right.

Mr. Gwyn, just before entering the military service, was married to Miss Janie Johnson. They now have a daughter and two sons — a happy family. Mr. Gwyn works hard, pays his debts and teaches his children to work.
