Highway Patrolman Jim Coman Transferred to Iredell

Jim Coman, of Winston-Salem, a State highway patrolman who has operated in the Stokes territor, for several years, has I con t.tansferred from this territory to Iredell county. Mr. Coman has been a most vigilant officer. and acting in conjunction with deputy sheriffs has apprehended many alleged viola ors of the State highway laws. Recently he has been severely criticised for what many term as over-activity in the line of his duties. It is reported here superintendent of the county that Sheriff Shore of Forsyth was influential in the removal of Coman, who, it is alleged, often went out of his way to become officious and abusive of offenders. Recently Coman was tried in the courts of Forsyth for an assault on some negroes. He was acquitted at the trial.
