Miss Jenkins, a native of Nash county, has been Assistant Home Demonstration Agent for two years in Nash county with headquarters in Nashville. In her home demonstration work in Nashville, Miss Jenkins has been associated with Mrs. Effie Vines Gordon in work with the Nash county Home Demonstration Clubs and 4-H Clubs. Miss Jenkins also cooperated with the farm women and Mrs. Gordon in operating a Farm Women's Curb Market at Rocky Mount.

With this background of excellent training and rich experience Miss Jenkins is well equipped for her new work as County Home Demonstration Agent in Stokes county.

Miss Jenkins is bringing to Stokes county Miss Sallie Brooks, assistant extension specialist in foods and nutrition, who will give some special demonstrations on bread making. Miss Brooks will demonstrate the making of liquid yeast and the various types of yeast rolls at two meetings this week.

The first bread demonstration will be given at the King Club House Thursday afternoon, March 3 at two o'clock.

Another meeting will be held Friday afternoon, March 4 at two o'clock at Sandy Ridge high school.

HOMICIDE AT SANDY RIDGE

HENRY BROWN DIES FROM A BLOW ON THE HEAD BY ROCK — TWO RICHARDSON BOYS IN JAIL CHARGED WITH THE CRIME.

Henry Brown, Sandy Ridge young man, aged 37, died in a Leaksville hospital Friday morning from injuries received in a fight at his brother's O. T. Brown's, filling station two or three miles north of Sandy Ridge, Thursday night.

John Richardson, aged 25, and Jamie Richardson, aged 16, his brother, are in Danbury jail to await hearing charged with the death of Brown. These men were arrested by Stokes officers soon after the killing.

The Richardsons—so it is reported to officers—got into a general row with several people at the filling station, during which rocks were thrown. The Richardsons are charged with throwing rocks into the filling station, after which Brown was found lying unconscious on the floor. Fred Amos, Jno. Wilson and Jno. Joyce are reported involved in the fracas.

A hearing will probably be held at Danbury this week.
