Harry Williamson Of Pine Hall and His Distinguished Ancestry

William Bethel came to this country from Wales in 1750. He settled in Wentworth, then in Guilford county, where he acquired several thousand acres of land. He was in the N. C. Senate in 1800—a captain in the Revolutionary war in which conflict he fought at the Battle of Guilford Courthouse.

When Rockingham county was taken from Guilford, he became Clerk of Court, holding that office until his death; in 1804. The Gaol or jail and county Court House were built on lots sold to the county by him.

His son, William, was in the N. C. State Senate in the years 1815-20. He served as a Major under Col. Scales in the War of 1812.

One hundred and sixty two years after the coming of William Bethel to Wentworth, his great, great grandson—Harry H. Williamson—now of Pine Hall—was sworn in as Commissioner of the county his ancestor helped to create.

Instructions On Using Remedy For Blue Mold

Blue mold has made its appearance in tobacco beds in Eastern North Carolina during the last several days. The disease was first observed this spring in Columbus and Robeson counties and now it has been found in Pitt and Greene counties also.

Blue mold may or may not seriously affect Stokes county tobacco plant beds this year, however all growers should be on the lookout for this dreaded plant bed disease. In the past tobacco farmers have been almost helpless when this disease attacked their beds, there were only a few things they could do, such as promote the healthiest and most rapidly growing plants. This was only partially satisfactory.
