## You Can Fish From Easter Saturday Until Easter Monday.

County Game Protector Chas. H. Martin informs the Reporter that the State department at Raleigh will temporarily lift the ban on fishing, and allow anglers to indulge their sport on April 16, beginning at midnight, and extending to midnight, April 18.

This gives you the chance to legally catch fish Saturday, Sunday and Monday, which includes the Easter holidays.

Fishermen who land any unspawned female fish during the period of grace are urged to release such fish carefully after dampening their hands. The taking of one fish which has not spawned, according to the State commissioner, would result in the destruction of possibly several thousands of eggs and many mature fish in future years.
