A. R. Phillips States His Platform

WINSTON-SALEM PRODUCTION C. A.

STOKES EMBRACED IN THE GROUP OF COUNTIES IN THE ASSOCIATION. AND A. J. ELLINGTON IS LOCAL REPRESENTATIVE.

Farmers are becoming intensely interested in financing their needs for general agricultural purposes through a production credit association, for they know that the associations through their representatives go to the money markets of the world and there borrow in large quantities at a low rate of interest, and this money is loaned to them without profit.

There is a production credit association that offers its resources to farmers who wish to avail themselves of its services for general agricultural purposes in every county in every state in the United States. These associations are farmer owned and farmer controlled in that the farmers themselves who take advantage of this permanent system of agricultural credit select among eligible borrowers five men as directors who control the policy of the association and who assume the responsibilities of efficient management and of making sound loans.

The Winston-Salem Production Credit Association embraces Alleghaney, Ashe, Caldwell, Davidson, Forsyth, Stokes, Surry, Watauga, Wilkes, and Yadkin counties. The home office is in the Trade Street Branch of the Wachovia Bank Building, Winston-Salem, North Carolina. The directors are all successful farmers. They are: W. H. Hardy, Siloam; E. S. Welborn, No. 1, Thomasville; J. R. Forrest, Francisco; A. B. Hobson, Boonville, and Paul J. Vestal, Moravian Falls. L. E. Francis is Secretary-Treasurer.

During the year of 1937 the Association loaned \$118,000.00.

As of April 16, 1937, farmers had borrowed through this Association \$89,131.27. As of April 16, 1938, farmers had borrowed \$106,174.37. Thus, the indications are that the increase will be substantial, for \$17,443.10 has been loaned this year above the amount loaned last year at this time. The increase is explained by the fact that farmers are realizing the production credit association represents a permanent system of agricultural credit; that it finances farmers who are worthy of credit provided they present a satisfactory repayment plan; that it finances them during lean years as well as normal ones; that the rate of interest is 5 per cent. for the actual number of days they have use of the money; and that it offers courteous and efficient service to every applicant.

The amount of money that is yet available to farmers through the Winston-Salem Production Credit Association is unlimited. All that is required of a farmer who wishes to obtain a loan for general agricultural purposes
