The Rise In Stokes Literacy.

SOME INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT STOKES COUNTY HIGH SCHOOLS AS FOUND IN "STATE FACTS", PUBLISHED BY THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION.

The year 1936-1937 Stokes County operated 9 standard high schools, employed 33 high school teachers, enrolled 1062 high school students. Of this number, 164 graduated. The ratio graduated to the enrollment was 15.4 per cent. The county ranks twenty-fifth in the one hundred counties of the state.

Kentucky Visitors.

BURIAL OF LAZARUS S. GRABS.

HE WAS AGED 82, AND HIS DEATH FOLLOWED A LINGERING ILLNESS.—MRS. MARTHA ANNE MEADOWS IS STRICKEN—OTHER NEWS OF KING.

King, April 27.—Lazarus Shores, aged 82, died at his home in North Side Wednesday following a lingering illness of several months. He lived his entire life in and about King. When plans were formulated for the establishment of a local high school he was highly instrumental in helping to materialize those plans.

For a number of years he served on the school board. He was interested in the building of the various churches of the community and generously contributed toward the construction of the King Moravian Church. He was a charter member of the King Junior order. "Las" as he was familiarly known by his many friends, was known in the community as the "good neighbor," always being ready to assist or give of his material means where ever needful. Any worthwhile community project received his whole-hearted support and cooperation. In his going the community loses one of its highly respected citizens. He will be greatly missed in the home and community. He is survived by his wife, eight children and six grandchildren. One son, Baxter Grabs, having preceded him to the great beyond by several years. The surviving children are: Omnic and Manley Grabs of King, Mrs. Lula Pulliam, Mrs. C. Ross Newsom, Mrs. Minnie Boyles and Miss Bertie Grabs all of King, Mrs. C. E. Hunter of Tobaccoville and Mrs. T. E. Perry of North Wilkesboro. One brother, John S. Grabs of King also survives. The family extend their sincere thanks to neighbors and friends for their assistance and sympathy during this time of bereavement. Funeral service was conducted at the home Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. F. W. Grabs of Bethania and Rev. Edward C. Helmich of King were in charge of the service. Interment was in the King Moravian cemetery.
