REPUBLICAN MEMBER OF OLD BOARD OF EDUCATION, RETIRES FROM RACE—R. T. SPENCER IS AUTOMATICALLY ELECTED.

John W. Priddy of Snow Creek township, who has been the Republican member of the Stokes county board of education for 19 years, has formally withdrawn his name from the primary of June 4, and will not be a candidate for re-election. The other Republican member on the ticket, R. T. Spencer, is thus automatically elected.

The Democratic candidates for members of the board of education are as follows: Dr. G. R. Stone of King, P. O. Fry of Pinnacle, Frank R. Stone of Francisco and Herbert Robertson of Pine Hall.

Dr. G. R. Stone of King and P. O. Fry are present incumbents on the board. F. R. Stone of Francisco and Herbert Robertson of Pine Hall are contestants for the two places of the former.
