FOR SOLICITORSHIP

A. D. IVIE, JR., DEFEATED BY R. R. SCOTT IN FIRST PRIMARY BY OVER 1200, DEMANDS SECOND TRIAL—ROCKINGHAM NOW HOLDS JUDGESHIP.

Allan D. Ivie, Jr., of Leaksville, has challenged R. J. Scott of Danbury for the Democratic nomination for the solicitor of the 21st district.

The second primary between Ivie and Scott will be held on Saturday, July 2.

In the primary of June 4 Scott led Ivie by more than 1200 votes. Rockingham, which now has the judgeship, Allen Gwyn being nominated over all his opponents, and the nomination being equivalent to election, would now bid for the solicitorship also.

In the late primary Scott received strong support from Surry and Rockingham by Democrats who feel that Stokes is entitled to the solicitorship, never having had a State office.

Ivie claims the backing of Horton, Badgett and Carter, all of whom with himself were defeated by Scott.

Father Of S. G Sparger Dies At Baltimore

George W. Sparger, Sr., father of S. Gilmer Sparger, died Monday morning at 7:30 o'clock at his home at Baltimore, Md. He had been in ill health for two years.

The body was taken to Mt. Airy for the burial from the home of a son, George W. Sparger, Jr., at Mount Airy. The funeral will be held at Central Methodist Church at Mount Airy, Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

Surviving are the widow; three daughters, Mrs. W. M. Thomas, of Winston-Salem; Mrs. W. S. Dickson, of Larchmont, N. Y.; Miss Caroline Sparger, of Baltimore; and two sons, S. Gilmer Sparger, of Raleigh, and George W. Sparger, of Mount Airy.

Mr. Sparger, the deceased, formerly lived at Mt. Airy and was prominent in civic, business and political circles. He represented Surry and Stokes in the State Senate about 40 years ago.

HIGH LIGHTS OF THE PRIMARY

VOTE WAS NOT HEAVY THROUGH THE INTEREST WAS STRONG—DEMOCRATIC MEMBERS OF OLD SCHOOL BOARD RE-ELECTED—SHERIFF TAYLOR GETS BIGGEST VOTE FOLLOWED BY SCOTT FOR SOLICITOR.

The June 4 primary passed quietly in Stokes, though strong interest centered around some of the contests, particularly the school board, where a fight was on. The Democratic members of the old board, Dr. G. F. Stone, and P. O. Fry were re-elected. Other Democrats opposing Stone and Fry were Frank R. Stone and Herbert Robertson. The Republican member, J. W. Priddy, resigned, but nevertheless received 103 votes. R. T. Spencer, of Leaksville, Republican member of the board to succeed Priddy, and who was automatically elected by Priddy's resignation, received 561 votes in the primary.

Sheriff John Taylor received the best vote coming over his opponent A. R. Phillips by a majority of 2358. Scott for Solicitor came next with his large plurality over his opponents, Ivie, Badgett, Horton and Carter.

Present incumbents of the board of commissioners, Harvey Johnson and H. L. Gibson were renominated. H. H. Brown was nominated over Wall, Tedder and Hawkins.

J. Watt Tuttle, clerk of the court, was renominated over his opponent J. H. Baker.

Frank Hancock won over Reynolds for U. S. Senator in the county, while A. D. Folger was nominated for congress over Marshall Kurpees and Geo. Fulp.

For judge, Allen H. Gwyn was high man over Judge E. C. Bivens and J. M. Sharp.

William F. Marshall won over N. S. Mullican and Stedman Garner for House of Representatives.

The Republicans nominated Hobart Browder for the legislature who received 377 votes to the 235 garnered by his opponent Edwin Kiser.

For utilities commissioner Winston Grady received 1288 to 886 by Grady.

Assisting will be Miss Ellen Jenkins, our county home demonstrator.

Mrs. McTeer will give a demonstration in the canning of fruits and vegetables.

A large majority of homemakers have learned to put up food so that it will keep. Mrs. Homemaker is now learning that canned food should do more than keep and that if she is to be a successful canner she must learn to select, prepare, pack and process foods in a manner which will preserve their natural, freshly cooked flavor, color, and food value. With this in mind, Mrs. McTeer reviews the fundamental principles of canning and at the same time emphasizes the steps which must be taken if one is to reach the summit of successful home canning.

Mrs. McTeer is well qualified to give these demonstrations. She is an alumna of the University of Tennessee and has had further study at Teachers College, Columbia University and more at Maryville College. Evidence is Mrs. McTeer's knowledge of her subject and her ability to impart knowledge to others is the fact that for five years the club women in her county led the other 253 counties in Texas, in the number of prizes won on home canned food exhibited at the Dallas fair.
