COUNTY BOARD CUTS TAX RATE

COMMISSIONERS FIX TENTATIVE RATE AT \$1.65—BOARD GOES ON RECORD FOR BLUE SUNDAYS—NOTHING SAID ABOUT SUNDAY BASEBALL.

A tentative tax rate of \$1.65 on hundred dollars valuation was fixed for years 1938-39 by the county commissioners in regular session here Tuesday, July 5, this date having been decided upon for the meeting instead of the regular first Monday of July 4, this being legal holiday.

A full board was present as follows: Rev. J. A. Joyce, chairman; H. L. Gibson and Harvey Johnson.

In response to requests of several citizens asking for a blue Sunday, the board went on record as opposed to the sale of wine and beer or the operation of pool tables on Sunday.

The matter of Sunday baseball was not discussed.

After the regular routine of business consisting mainly in the payment of claims, the board adjourned.

SCOTT'S MAJORITY MORE THAN 6,000

DANBURY MAN DEFEATS IVIE FOR SOLICITOR IN A LANDSLIDE—SURREY AND STOKES GAVE SCOTT OVERWHELMING ENDORSEMENT—IVIE CARRIED ROCKINGHAM AND CASWELL BY SMALL MAJORITIES—VOTE IN STOKES BY PRECINCTS.

Ralph J. Scott was nominated over A. D. Ivie, Jr., in last Saturday's primary by a majority of more than 6,000 votes. His majority in Stokes was 3,178 and in Surry 3,487. Ivie carried Rockingham and Caswell by small majorities.

The vote by counties: Stokes, complete, Scott 3,346; Ivie, 167; Surry, complete, Scott, 3,855, Ivie, 368; Rockingham, 20 out of 23 precincts, Scott 1,521; Ivie, 1886; Caswell, 10 out of 13 precincts, Scott, 593; Ivie 646; totals, Scott, 9,315; Ivie, 3,067.

Bill Payne Buried As Family Watches

High Point, July 2.—Bill Payne, who died for murder in the state prison gas chamber before the watchful eyes of 35 curious people, today was buried in Abbots Creek Baptist Church cemetery while his relatives stood around the open grave.

Only members of his family attended funeral services held in the little chapel of the Sechrest Funeral Home here. Dr. A. B. Conrad, pastor of the First Baptist Church, and Rev. J. M. Hilliard conducted the services.

A brief funeral ritual and burial quietly closed Payne's career of crime which made news headlines for many months.

Prison Chaplain E. C. Cooper characterized Payne and his Companion, Was Turner, who died for the same crime, as "two country boys gone wrong." While Turner sat dying in the gas chamber, Payne said "that his only regret was that he didn't know the Christian way before."
