The new claims, technically, will ask the refund on the grounds of the bill providing such refund that was passed by Congress just before its adjournment, instead of on the grounds of the unconstitutionality of the act as set out before.

Growers who have already filed claims, however, may refer to the old ones in their requests, eliminsting the necessity for again obtaining warehouse bills and proof of payment if such was included in the old claims.

The tax collected under the Kerr Smith tobacco act amounted to from \$1,500,000 to \$2,000,000 in North Carolina.

Both acts, corollaries of the AAA, were rescinded by Congress in 1936 in deference to the Supreme Court opinion holding the AAA unconstutitional and the repayment of the tax was provided in a rider to the deficiency bill pushed through in the closing minutes of the past session.
