

FARM TENANTS TO GET HELP

UNDER THE BANKHEAD-JONES ACT THEY CAN OBTAIN CASH TO BUY OR IMPROVE FARMS — SUPERVISOR CHEVES WILL BE IN DANBURY THURSDAYS.

J. E. Cheves of Reidsville will be in Danbury on Thursday of each week to receive applications from tenant farmers for money with which to buy and improve farms.

Mr. Cheves is County RSA supervisor under the provisions of the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act. He will be assisted by a 3-farmer county advisory committee to examine applications, appraise prosperity, etc.

Mr. Cheves says: "Borrowers will have the aid of the Farm Security Administration in building or repairing their houses and in making plans to do better farming.

"These tenant purchase loans will be made to a limited number of qualified tenants, sharecroppers and farm laborers, to purchase and improve family-sized farms and to become more secure in their farming operations by the use of approved farming practices."

Mr. Cheves stated that the tenant purchase program is being carried out by the Farm Security Administration, which agency also administers the rehabilitation and farm debt adjustment programs. He further stated that although land purchase loans are limited, regular rehabilitation loans for such items as seed, fertilizer, livestock and farm tools are available in every county to eligible farmers and farm tenants able to secure suitable credit elsewhere.
