NEW YORK—The largest portrait statue executed in modern times will honor George Washington at the New York World's Fair. It will be 65 feet tall and will depict Washington as he arrived for his inauguration exactly 150 years previous to the opening day of the Fair, April 30, 1789. Its mass will be 500 times that of a man.

## 6,000 Stokes Children To Get Tickets To State Fair

Superintendent J. C. Carson of Stokes county schools announced today he had received free tickets to the North Carolina State Fair, which will be held in Raleigh October 11-15, for distribution to all of Stokes county's 6,000 children in the public schools. He will distribute the tickets next week.

Dr. J. S. Dorton of Shelby, Manager of the State Fair, has designated Friday, October 14, as Young North Carolinians' Day at the Fair. Tickets will be available for 900,000 school children to be guests of the State on that day, he declared.

Wake county school children will be admitted free Tuesday to lessen congestion on Friday of fair week.

Governor Clyde R. Hoey has joined Dr. Dorton in expressing the urgent hope that as many children as possible take advantage of their free tickets to the fair.

"No fair is complete unless children have an opportunity to see the exhibits and enjoy the entertainment features", declared Manager Dorton. "We want to see the midway full of youngsters on Friday of fair week."

In addition to an imposing array of exhibits, the children will find much to interest them at the fair. The gigantic Johnny J. Jones Exposition, with 40 high-type rides and shows, will be a brand new attraction on the midway. A dozen thrilling hippodrome acts will be presented in noon and night, and a sparkling grandstand arena each after-musical comedy will feature each evening's program.

## New York's Fair and Skyline, All in One Picture



NEW YORK—Proximity of the New York World's Fair 1939 to Manhattan is shown in this "location" photograph taken from the Bermuda Clipper "Cavaller" flying above the Government Zone of the exposition. The familiar skyscraper skyline of Manhattan is shown here nine miles away, but within fifteen minutes ride by rail. Note the patterns of buildings, foundations, gardens and thoroughfares emerging in the Central Exhibit Area and the fine finish of landscaping

about the steelwork of the 700 foot Trylon and 200 foot Perisphere and along the broad Constitutional Mall.

Shown, right, are the elevated tracks of the IRT-BMT subway systems and, nearer, the Long Island Railroad tracks crossing the lowered Grand Central Parkway Extension. The pontoon of the plane obscures view of the Triborough Bridge, one of the main approaches to the Fair. The buildings shown are among forty already under construction.
