WALTER L. NELSON ROY - WATSON MAY SUE SOMEBODY RITES AT PINNACLE

DEFEATED FRANCISCO OAN- NEWLY WEDS TO RESIDE AT DIDATE FOR CONSTABLE ALLEGES DAMAGE TO CHARACTER -THE WATCH INCIDENT MAY RESULT IN CIVIL ACTION FOR SLAND-DR.

Walter Lee Nelson of Francisco, defeated candidate for constable at Francisco in the late election, was in town Wednesday. He says he came to see about employing a

lawyer in a suit for damage to his character resulting from an article published in the last issue of the Reporter.

The article in question alleged that "a candidate for constable at Francisco admitted that he took two watches from merchant Eli-Beasley, and settled for them at the polls where he was work-ing in the election. He paid the owner of the watches, or rather paid the cash for one and returned the other. Beasley claimed three watches had been stolen, but Nelson denied that he got more than two.

Mr. Nelson was a candidate for constable on the Republican ticket against E. E. Shelton, Democrat. He received 158 votes, while She!ton got 335.

Mr. Nelson, at the Reporter office Wednesday, inquired of this newspaper its authority for stat-ing that he had stolen the jewelry. The Reporter man pointed out to him that nobody's name was mentioned as the purloiner of ry. the watches. But he said it was meant for him, and he indignantly denied that he had stolen "the atches. He said he offered the lady clerk in Beasley's store a \$5 bill, but she could not change the money. He then took two watches, but surrendered one of them to, the owner of the store later at the voting precinct, while he paid the merchant \$1.00 for the other.

TO LET CONTRACT FOR PRISON CAMP

STATE HIGHWAY WILL RE-CEIVE BIDS TODAY FOR \$40,000 STRUCTURE AT MEA-DOWS-LOCAL LABOR TO BE EMPLOYED.

Advices received here from Division Engineer Zeb V. Stewart disclose that the contract for the new prison camp in Stokes to be built at Meadows will be let today.

This structure, which will be modern in every detail, will replace the old highway camp which has been located near the county home for several years. It will be built of brick, and will cost around \$40,000, possibly \$50,000. Local labor as far as practicable ford Kiser and small son, Zane, will be employed in the building of the camp, which will take care of more than 100 convicts.

County Superintendent of convict camp, P. H. Hanes; assistant, Reid George; county superinter.-dent of construction J. R. Forrest, Jr., and other attaches of the present quarters near the county home, are highly elated at the prospect of early construction of a modern plant.

Work is expected to begin at once.

Mass Meeting Of Farmers

A mass meeting of Stokes county farmers will be held at the Walnut Cove High School auditorium Friday night, December 2, at 7 p. m. The purpose of this meeting is to discuss tobacco crop control for 1939. Mr. G. T. Scott, a member of the State AAA committee and a North Carolina farmer and tobacco grower, will

make the principal address. Every tobacco grower in North Carolina, whether a landlord or tenant, is urged to attend the meeting and familiarize himself with the details of the 1939 program. The question of tobacco control or no tobacco control in 1939 will vitally affect every tobacco grower in the ccounty. Growers owe it to themselves to learn as much as possible on both sides of the question before voting in the referenda on December 10. Several changes in the 1939 control program have been made which, it is felt, will make the trol program have been made program more workable next year with the bases and allotments more equitable between farms. Scott, in the meeting at Walnut Cove wi'l explain these changes and how they affect each farmer. The meeting will be open for discussion and for questions from the farmers. Plan now to attend. J. F.
