Former Walnut Cove Girl Meets Tragic Death

MRS. CHARLES A. ADAMS FATALLY INJURED WEDNESDAY MORNING IN CAR ACCIDENT IN GREENSBORO—FUNERAL TO BE HELD FRIDAY.

Mrs. Charles A. Adams was fatally injured in an automobile wreck in Greensboro Wednesday morning at the intersection of Walker and Scott avenues. Her car collided with one driven by Starr Davis. Mrs. Adams was taking her children to school. Charles Jr., riding on the front seat with his mother, received cuts on his face while Donald, riding on the back seat was unhurt.

Mrs. Adams was thrown clear of the wreckage and is said to have received a fractured skull. She died enroute to the hospital. Davis is now in the hospital and has been charged with manslaughter.

Mrs. Adams is the former Mildred Moorefield, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. Wesley Moorefield, of Northview and Walnut Cove. She was 33 years of age.

The deceased is survived by her husband, assistant production manager of the Vick Chemical Company; three sons, Charles A. Jr., Donald and Gerald Adams; seven sisters, Mrs. J. B. Gwyn and Mrs. H. E. Dilley, of Greensboro; Mrs. D. C. Taylor, of Gap; Mrs. J. D. Franks, of Altamahaw; Mrs. Joe Chambers of Augusta, Ga.; Mrs. Johnnie Kress, of Camden, N. J.; and Mrs. E. H. Carter, Danville, Va.; two brothers, Lester and Hassell Moorefield of High Point.

Funeral services will be held at the Presbyterian church in Greensboro Friday at 3 o'clock. Dr. Charles F. Myers, pastor, will conduct the service. Interment will be in Forest Lawn cemetery.
