Marshall Introduces Bill To Establish Special Law District in **Stokes County**

Raleigh, March 10. - Representative W. F. Marshall of Stokes today introduced a bill so establish a special law-enforce ment district in Stokes county to be known as the King law enforcement district. The bill was referred to house judiciary com mittee No. 2 of which George Uzzell of Rowan is chairman.

The bill sets out that the pur pose of establishing the district is to promote more thorough and diligent enforcement of all criminal laws and especially those re lating to the manufacture, sale, use and transportation of intoxicating liquors, beverages and drugs by providing the means whereby special law enforcement officers may be employed on a salary basis.

The bill establishes the following boundaries for the district Beginning at the Forsyth county line on state highway 66 then west along the line to the Little Yadkin River: North up the Lit. tle Yadkin River to Danbury Creek; then east following Danbury Creek, crossing Goff road to the Sam Brown place; thence following the Sam Brown and Ed Jessup road to the Riley and Bill Smith road; thence along Riley Fulp and Bill Smith road to Joe Lawson's north line and at or near the intersection of King's Cross-Roads at the old State highway shed; along John Lawson's north line eastwardly to W I. Warner's north line; thence eastward with W. I. Warner's line to highway 66 and south along the highway to the beginning marker.

The bill provides for a commission of three to have charge of the district and names the following as commissioners: C. S. Newsom, Charles R. Carroll and Dr. R. S. Helsabeck. They would serve without pay until June, 1941, after which commissioners would be elected for two-year

The bill also would empower commissioners to levy collect taxes and to construct a An election on the tax question would be set for next

The ability to interpret financial statements is as important to the business executive as to the accountant. The day has passed when even the smallest business can be operated successfully without financial statements and the constant study of the information they contain.

Ot the great number of men who go into business for themselves each year, only a few meet with sufficient success to enable them to continue to operate. Statisticians have estimated that from 80 to 90 per cent of all small businesses ultimately fail all small businesses ultimately fail. The principal cause of failure is lack of business knowledge. Many small enterprises are started when a cursory study of the market available would show that there was no possibility of sufficient sales being obtained regularly to meet operating expenses, let alone to pay interest on the money invested and to yield the owner a profit. Many businesses that have the possibility of success fail because their owners have insufficient understanding of business principles and methods.

The direct aim of the business man is to make a profit out of which to support himself and his dependents and to lay aside savings in as large an amount as possible to constitute a computative for his ded age. all small businesses ultimately fail.

large an amount as possible to con-stitute a competence for his old age. This desire to make money by engaging in business for one's self is typically American and perfectly legitimate, but cannot be fulfilled today without study of all the important aspects of business.
