TOBACCO MARKETS OPEN SEPT. 14

STOKES FARMERS MAY SELL THEIR PRODUCT TWO WEEKS EARLIER THIS YEAR — THOUSANDS OF POUNDS USUALLY MARKETED DOWN EAST WILL SELL AT HOME MARKETS.

Universal satisfaction is expressed by farmers that the tobacco markets of the old belt—which includes Winston-Salem, Mt. Airy, Madison, Martinsville and Stoneville—will open on September 14 this year, two weeks earlier than the usual time.

This is the earliest opening date for the warehouses of this section for many years.

It will mean that many thousands of pounds of Stokes tobacco that has usually gravitated to the markets of eastern North Carolina due to the late opening of the old belt markets, will remain here and will be sold on the home markets this season.

The full slate of openings for the markets are: Georgia, July 25; South Carolina, August 3; Eastern North Carolina, August 22; Middle Belt, September 7; Old Belt, September 14; Virginia, November 27.

WILL HIGH POINT TURN TO STOKES?

JUDGE SINK STOPS CITY FROM BUILDING PLANT IN YADKIN — ISSUES INJUNCTION AGAINST HUGE HYDRO-ELECTRIC DEVELOPMENT.

Judge Sink says the Yadkin is not a navigable stream and that therefore High Point has no right to enter into a contract with the federal power commission to furnish the money to finance the huge \$6,500,000 hydro-electric development. The judge, whereupon, issues a restraining order against further work on the Yadkin plant, on which \$300,000 already has been spent. Three hundred men are thrown out of work.

High Point announces it will appeal to the State Supreme Court, and if turned down there, will ask the U. S. Supreme Court to determine the matter. Nearly a year must elapse before this litigation can be tried, with the chances then that Judge Sink's decision will be upheld.

In the meantime, many people are wondering if the city of High Point will turn to Stokes county's water powers to secure their power developments.

While the same reasons that scotch the Yadkin development may militate against the construction here, the investment on the Dan would mean probably one or two million dollars less than the projected vast Yadkin outlay. Thus revised financial adjustments might switch the big hydro-electric plant to Stokes.

Judge Sink also ruled that the city of High Point had no right under the law to condemn land owned by Yadkin county for the development. It is stated the Yadkin county home property would have been submerged by the waters. His Honor proclaimed that High Point could not do this. This difficulty would be obviated in Stokes as no county property would be involved.

For the present time and for an indefinite time to come the big High Point-Yadkin river proposed development is dead as a door nail.
