Despite all that England and France could do, Alolph Hitler, Dictator of Germany, invades Poland to recover the city of Danzig and the corridor to East Prussia.

Today German armies are pushing steadily through Poland, sweeping the Poles before them. The city of Warsaw, Polish capital, continuously bombarded from the air and shelled by Hitler's armies, is being evacuated by the civil populations.
