## WAR IN EUROPE

War breaks in Europe again.

Despite all that England and France could do, Adolph Hitler, Dictator of Germany, invades Poland to recover the city of Danzig and the corridor to East Prussia.

Today German armies are pushing steadily through Poland, sweeping the Poles before them. The city of Warsaw, Polish capital, continuously bombarded from the air and shelled by Hitler's armies, is being evacuated by the civil populations. Hundreds of non-combatant men, women and children have been killed. No one knows the size of the German armies, which must be millions. All the man power of the Poles is fighting them, consisting of more than 2 million troops, but the German steam roller goes on. Military experts believe Germany will conquer Poland in a few weeks.

In the meantime England and France, allies of Poland and sworn to come to its assistance when attacked, have yet been able to do but little toward relieving the desperately assailed Poles. The British fleet, in control of the seas, has instituted a blockade of German ports. Several German merchantmen have been sunk or captured. A German submarine off the coast of Ireland torpedoed a British liner loaded with more than a thousand passengers, 350 of them being Americans sailing for home from Europe. About 90 persons were killed or drowned, several perhaps being citizens of the United States.

France has attacked the Siegfried line, it is not known in what force. No material progress has yet been made toward piercing it. The Siegfried line reaches from Belgium to Switzerland, and is closely parallel to the French Maginot line. Either of these bulwarks are practically invulnerable, being more than a hundred feet deep, lined with steel and concrete, equipped with all modern defense methods, costing uncounted millions to build.

It is not clear how Poland's friends will be able to reach her side in this gigantic struggle, as the way lies either through Germany's impregnable defense line, or through neutral countries, else the water routes. The North Sea near Danzig is heavily mined, while the ocean swarms with German submarines. To enter Poland by the Dardanelles route would only land the transports on Rumanian (neutral) soil or Russian (hostile) country. It looks extremely bad for Poland at this time.

The President of the United States has proclaimed a neutral position for this country.

Australia, New Zealand, India and some other British dominions have announced their determination to fight with England.

While Canada has not yet spoken, it is certain that the Canadians will be loyal to the mother country.

It looks like the longest and bloodiest war in the history of the world. Already after only 4 or 5 days of fighting, the toll of dead and wounded from air plane raids is greater than that of the four years of the World War casualties from the air.
